To the Honorable the Legislature:

Pursuant to Section 16.11(3)(i)(2), Wis. Stats., I am enclosing a copy of the annual report of the Midwest Interstate Low-Level Radioactive Waste Commission.

As the host state for the Midwest region's first low-level radioactive waste disposal facility, Michigan is proceeding with its siting process and expects by early 1990 to select three sites for detailed technical characterization. Michigan's present schedule for site development calls for the facility to begin operation sometime in 1995. Because the federal Low-Level Radioactive Waste Policy Act enables the three currently operating commercial sites in the country to stop accepting waste by 1993, waste generators in Wisconsin and the six other Midwest states will need to store their waste on-site for approximately three years. A survey of radioactive-materials users in Wisconsin conducted this year indicates that we have 25 waste generators who will be storing approximately 28,000 cubic feet of waste until the Michigan site opens.

I call your attention to the discussion on page five of the annual report regarding compact amendments. As we proceed with the details of developing a regional disposal site, it has become evident that the relationship and responsibilities of the host state and the other party states need to be clarified and strengthened. The Commission is nearing completion of proposed amendments to the compact that will address, among other things, financial assurances for the host state, shared liability, and long-term stability of the compact. The Commission will be recommending enactment of these amendments by each member state's legislature, and I will work with you on this task.

I encourage you to review the report and become acquainted with the activities of the Commission over the past year. If you have any questions, please don't hesitate to contact me.
