A Proclamation

1. Tommy G. Thompson, Governor of the State of Wisconsin, pursuant to Article IV, Section 11 and Article V, section 4 of the Constitution of Wisconsin, do require the convening of a special session of the Legislature at the Capitol in Madison, beginning on Tuesday, May 15, 1990 at 10:00 A.M. solely to consider legislation in the following subject areas:

1. Legislation relating to ratification of certain state employees contracts.
