**GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE**

August 27, 1991

To the Honorable Members of the Assembly:

I have approved **Assembly Bill 350** as 1991 Wisconsin Act 46 and have deposited it in the Office of the Secretary of State. I have exercised my partial veto authority in Section 1 as it relates to the appropriations for the Department of Administration, Office of Justice Assistance and Section 2 as it relates to funding additional positions.

Section 1 provides that, from the federal funding received by the Office of Justice Assistance (OJA) in appropriations under s. 20.505(6)(pb) and (pc), OJA should allocate funding for deoxyribonucleic acid (DNA) testing by the Department of Justice and a field response unit at the Wausau crime laboratory. I have vetoed the specific reference to the (pb) and (pc) alpha appropriations because the reference to two federal appropriations is in error. The language should refer to the federal appropriation under s. 20.505 (6) (pc) and the program revenue appropriation under s. 20.505 (6) (h). This program revenue, derived from penalty assessments, is used in concert with the federal anti-drug funding to serve as the state's matching funds. Through this veto, I am maintaining the preferred allocation of both program revenue and federal funds.

Section 2 provides GPR funding in the 1991-93 biennium for DNA testing, additional positions at the Wausau crime laboratory and the establishment of a field response program at the Wausau crime laboratory. I am partially vetoing Section 2 to eliminate the authorization and GPR funding for 3.0 GPR FTE positions because 1991 Wisconsin Act 39, the 1991-93 biennial budget bill, provided 2.5 FTE GPR positions for the Wausau crime laboratory and adding an additional 3.0 FTE positions is excessive.

I am approving the funding for DNA testing by the Department of Justice. I am also approving the establishment of the field response program at the Wausau crime laboratory to make the most efficient use of DOJ personnel at the Wausau crime laboratory, and to improve prosecution efforts.
