GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE

December 6, 1991

To the Honorable Members of the Assembly:

I am vetoing **Assembly Bill 364** in its entirety. This bill requires the Elections Board to prepare a voter registration brochure and form for inclusion in the driver's license renewal notice mailed by the Department of Transportation. The form is to be returned to the Election Board and forwarded by the board to the appropriate municipal clerk. The bill authorizes .5 FTE and appropriates \$27,500 GPR in fiscal year 1991-1992 and \$55,000 GPR in fiscal year 1991-93.

I am vetoing this bill because Wisconsin already has one of the best voter registration programs in the nation. Our voter turn-out in recent elections has been among the highest in the nation. Wisconsin is also one of three states to permit same-day voter registration at a polling place. The openness of our system has resulted in a specific exemption from proposed federal legislation requiring the type of voter registration proposed in AB 364. While some states may have impediments to voter registration, they simply do not exist in Wisconsin.

AB 364 also involves substantial costs, both apparent and hidden. The Executive Director of the Elections Board, in an analysis of AB 364, suggested that the costs of the bill outweighed any benefit. He also raised many other questions about AB 364 which warrant careful attention. I have attached a copy of that analysis to this message.

Also under AB 364, to avoid an increase in DOT mailing costs, the organ donor card, which carries important information and encourages organ donation, would be deleted from the driver license renewal package to accommodate the voter registration information. This is literally life-saving information which I am uncomfortable displacing.

Lastly, voter registration is currently the responsibility of municipal clerks or in some cases, a board of election

commissioners. I see no reason for the state to usurp local authority in this matter, especially when local responsibility has contributed to an already effective system. In fact, my office was contacted by two municipalities requesting that AB 364 be vetoed. Those two municipalities cited serious administrative burdens and possible additional costs that this bill would require them to incur.

In summary, AB 364 is a bill which attempts to remove barriers to voter registration which we do not experience in Wisconsin. In doing so it creates new costs to the state and local units of government, creates an added administrative burden, and interposes the DOT into state election law. Meanwhile the bill displaces material that saves the lives of Wisconsin citizens. I see no justification for permitting this bill to become law. I am, therefore, vetoing this bill and the appropriation it makes.

To the Honorable, the Legislature:

This report is transmitted as required by ss.20.002(11)(f) of the Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under section 13.172(3) stats.), and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative balances during the month of October, 1991.

On October 3, 1991, the Agrichemical Management Fund (Fund 59) balance was \$-5 thousand. This shortfall continued until October 10th when the Recycling Fund balance reached \$511 thousand. The shortfall was due to a delayed accounting transfer.

The Agrichemical Management Fund shortfall was not in excess of the \$400 million ceiling and did not exceed the balances of the funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the quarterly calculation by State Finance will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority.

We have completed financial audits of WHA Television and WHA Radio, public communications entities operated by the University of Wisconsin-Extension. The audits were requested by the University of Wisconsin-Extension to fulfill the audit requirements of the Corporation for Public Broadcasting.
