To the Honorable, the Legislature:

This report is transmitted as required by ss. 20.002(11)(f) of the Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under section 13.172(3) stats.), and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative balances during the month of December, 1991.

On December 5, 1991, the Agrichemical Management Fund (Fund 59) balance was \$-44 thousand. This shortfall continued through the end of December when the balance was \$-160 thousand. The shortfall is due to the timing of revenues to the fund.

The Agrichemical Management Fund Shortfall was <u>not</u> in excess of the \$400 million ceiling and <u>did not</u> exceed the balances of the funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by State Finance will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority.

Wisconsin Act 82, signed by Governor Thompson on November 25, 1991, included a provision requiring that the Office of the Commissioner of Insurance and the Department of Industry, Labor and Human Relations study and report on recommendations to facilitate the reintroduction of private pollution liability insurance for owners and operators of underground petroleum product storage tank systems. The report was to be submitted by February 1, 1992.

Public hearings were held on the insurance question on January 8th and 13th. Written comments and testimony were accepted until January 21, 1992. This letter is to inform you that, although the study is nearing completion, we wish to delay submittal of the report in

order provide time to develop and verify some data elements. We expect this review to be complete in February and intend to submit the report to you no later than March 1.

In accordance with section 9125 (14e) of 1991 Wisconsin Act 39, you will find enclosed the Department of Health and Social Services' report on Early Intervention Services, commonly known as the Birth to Three program. The report summarizes the Department's activities regarding implementation of the Birth to Three program. In addition, the report contains the Department's recommendation to continue implementation of the program at the fourth year level, as allowed under federal reauthorization of the Birth to Three program.

Included with the Department's report are two separate reports which provide additional information about the Birth to Three programs. The first report is the Birth to Three "Annual Report" to the Governor and the U.S. Department of Education Secretary for federal fiscal year 1991. This report describes the State's early intervention system and provides current information regarding the number of children served, the personnel providing services, and the cost of these services. The second report is th "Performance Report" to the U.S. Department of Education for federal fiscal year 1991. The report describes Wisconsin's progress in meeting the Birth to Three program requirements of Part H of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA).

Although Wisconsin began fourth year implementation of the Birth to Three program in October 1991, most counties began fourth years implementation in January 1992. As a result, the Department has been unable to collect the detailed information regarding current resources available to support early intervention services or information necessary to estimate the fiscal impact of implementing the fifth year of the program. Such information will be needed prior to making an informed

recommendation on Wisconsin's continued participation in the Birth to Three program.
