SUBJECT: Division of Housing Programs

Since the Division of Housing was created in 1989 in the Department of Administration and new programs initiated, over 8,000 low- and moderate-income households in Wisconsin have been provided with housing assistance.

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The extent of assistance ranges from low cost rehabilitation loans, one-time rental subsidies, grants for rental security deposits, weatherization assistance, closing cost financial help, insurance and down payment grants for first-time home buyers in participating communities with qualifying incomes.

These programs have helped people in dire housing need including the elderly, families with limited incomes, victims of domestic violence with little money and no place to go, the homeless attempting to return to the mainstream of our communities, home buyers who have modest paying jobs but can handle modest mortgage payments equal to their current rent, and owners of homes that lack adequate insulation.

The programs are both innovative and effective. We have attempted to eliminate unnecessary red-tape, requiring a minimum amount of paperwork to move funding where it is needed, as quickly as possible, while preserving the integrity of the programs.

The state has joined in partnerships with municipalities, nonprofit organizations and community housing groups to improve local housing conditions. Our state dollars have attracted additional funding from many sources, expanding the impact of housing improvements in our communities.

While we have helped thousands, there are still thousands of people waiting to be helped. A number of agencies that have obtained grants expressed amazement at the number of inquiries they received after the awards were publicized. The extent of need surprised even those active in the communities.

To better acquaint you with the programs that are in place and to provide your staff with follow-up information, I have provided this brief guide to Division of Housing programs.

With consolidation of state housing programs in one division and Congressional approval of the new HOME federal housing money, we expect to see nearly \$70 million in state/federal funds committed to strengthen affordable housing programs in Wisconsin this biennium, a substantial increase over recent years.

We can be proud of these efforts which are helping to provide for the housing needs of many citizens.

To the Honorable, the Assembly:
