To the Honorable the Legislature:

Section 165.90 of the Wisconsin Statutes requires the Department of Justice to submit an annual report on the progress of county-tribal law enforcement programs which are funded under this section. This letter constitutes the report for 1992.

In 1992, 14 counties submitted requests for county-tribal law enforcement funding, totaling \$966,502. A total of \$614,200 was provided to 13 counties through a series of awards. This amount was awarded based upon the revenue available and the desire to sustain a stable funding level in future years. All of the counties received as much or more than they received in the prior year.

The funds awarded to counties were used for a variety of law enforcement services on tribal lands, including additional sheriff patrols; full-time tribal police deputized by sheriffs; workshops on DARE and other alcohol and drug abuse programs; criminal investigations; purchase of law enforcement equipment and squad cars; cultural sensitivity training for officers; and youth outreach programs.

For the first time since the program began, the Department of Justice conducted a field review of the program during 1992. Staff from the Office of Policy Analysis visited with the sheriff and tribal members of each participating county and tribe. Staff reviewed what was accomplished with the funding provided by the programs in 1991. In all but two cases, the field review concluded that the county-tribal law enforcement program has resulted in the substantial enhancement of law enforcement services to tribal areas. Two of the local programs were experiencing problems accountability and program design but have since resolved those problems. The Department of Justice intends to continue some level of field review on an annual basis in the future.

The county-tribal law enforcement program continues to progress in providing needed law enforcement services to residents of tribal lands in Wisconsin. I think you will agree that cooperation between the counties and the tribes has resulted in a successful program and one which is tailored to the needs of each tribal community.
