Last December, you received a letter from past DNR Secretary Buzz Besadny regarding the status of feasibility and economic impact studies to reopen the Portage Canal and reconstruct Fort Winnebago. Funds were provided to both the City of Portage and DNR in 1991 Senate Bill 483 to do these studies, along with a requirement that we provide you with the economic impact portion of the studies by December 31, 1992. The December letter indicated that the consultant hired by the City for this project had informed them that the studies would not be completed until January 31, 1993. I am writing to inform you that the consultant has still not completed the studies.

The Mayor of Portage has appointed a steering committee to work with the consultant, and this committee has had numerous meetings and discussions with the consultant. A member of my staff (Doug Fendry) is an ex officio member of the steering committee. The steering committee last met with the consultant on March 26, and provided him with the list of items that are needed to complete the studies. The City of Portage has given the consultant a deadline of April 15 to complete the studies. I will report back to you after the steering committee and my staff have a chance to review the draft studies.

I am disappointed that the studies have not been completed. However, I am confident that the City of Portage is doing everything in its power to get the studies completed. If you should have any questions about this project, please feel free to contact Mr. Fendry at (608) 267-2764.

According to Wisconsin Statute 38.12(11)(b), Gateway Technical College is required to report to you the methods used to inform students about sexual assault and sexual harassment on campus.

Gateway Technical College has complied with the statutes in the following manner. Student orientations occurred on all three campuses in August 1992. At that time, Julian Thomas, Gateway Technical College's affirmative action officer, made presentations to the students on the topics of sexual assaults and sexual harassment. The thrust of his comments were that

students had a right to report to his office any problems they encountered in the college community that were based on gender.

Gateway also published "Social Issues 1992-93." This publication includes a section on sexual harassment and major sections on sexual assaults and forcible rape statistics. The publication was sent to more than 29,000 students enrolled in the college's courses.
