Pursuant to Chapter 231.35(8) of Wisconsin Statutes, the Wisconsin Health and Educational Facilities Authority submits the following report:

The Rural Hospital Loan Guarantee Program (RHLGP) is now operational. An informational package including an application for the program has been sent to qualified health care institutions. The Authority has also held two program briefings for those institutions to attend and obtain further information. To date, one application for the program has been filed with the Authority. The Authority is in the process of working with this applicant, Osceola Medical Center, Osceola, Wisconsin, to structure a financing using the RHLGP. No loans have been guaranteed under this program. The annual gross revenues of borrowers who have received guarantees is zero. The default rate on such loans is also zero.

The Rural Hospital Loan Guarantee Fund has been funded with \$500,000 of state appropriations and currently has a fund balance of \$534,514.05.

The Wisconsin Health and Educational Facilities Authority will continue to administer the Rural Hospital Loan Guarantee Program and work with eligible borrowers as applications are submitted.

The University of Wisconsin System Board of Regents adopted the following resolution at its July meeting:

Pursuant to 1989 Wisconsin Act 186, s. 36.12(3)(a)(b), Wisconsin Statutes (effective April 24, 1990), the Board of Regents hereby accepts the attached report and directs that it be submitted to the chief clerk of each house of the legislature for the distribution to the appropriate standing committees under s. 13.172(3).

The referenced report is attached. The report details for the previous academic year: 1) the number of complaints received at each institution and center alleging a violation of the above statute, and a disposition of each such complaint, and 2) the number of requests for review of these complaints received by the Board of Regents.

A total of 139 complaints were received by the UW System institutions during the 1992-93 academic year. Of the 139 complaints, 89 complaints were resolved, 9 complaints requested no action be taken, 7 complaints were dismissed by the institution, 5 were withdrawn by the complainant, and 29 complaints are pending.

The Board of Regents did not receive any requests for review of the institutions' decisions in these cases.
