To the Honorable the Legislature:

As required by s. 118.37, Wis. Stats., enclosed is the statewide evaluation report of the postsecondary enrollment options (PSEO) program. The legislation requires the State Superintendent of Public Instruction to conduct an evaluation of the educational and fiscal effects of the PSEO program. To provide information for the evaluation, all school districts were asked to complete a survey form, PI-8702 by August 31, 1993, for the time period of July 1, 1992 to June 30, 1993. The survey form asked districts about their impressions and participation in the program while also soliciting their written comments and suggestions. Districts provided demographic and specific student information and responded to questions in the following areas:

- * Did the district establish additional course offerings as a result of PSEO?
- * Were courses cancelled as a result of PSEO?
- * Did the district realize savings in the costs for teachers, books, etc.?
- * Is the legislation viewed as positive?
- * Did students or parents evaluate the PSEO program?
- * Has transportation restricted participation in PSEO?
- * Has PSEO had an effect on student scheduling?

There were 364 school districts that responded to the survey, however, gaps do exist in the data since all the school districts did not consistently answer every question. The summary totals and a complete listing of actual comments from school districts regarding the PSEO program are included as separate documents in this report. The data summaries together with the richness of information in the comments do provide a view from the school districts about PSEO.

There were 733 students that applied to participate in the PSEO program, and when school districts answered the question regarding whether or not the legislation was viewed favorably, 154 responses indicated yes and 115 indicated no. The overwhelming majority of school districts did not cancel local courses as a result of PSEO. There were 50 responses indicating that additional courses, sections, or programs were established as a result of the PSEO. In asking if PSEO had an effect on student scheduling, 233 responses indicated they did not and 45 felt they did. Most school districts did not realize any savings in the costs for teachers, books, or materials. Neither parents or students have been active in evaluating the PSEO program. There were 87 responses indicating that transportation restricted students from participation in the program and 196 responses indicating this was not a problem.

The Department of Public Instruction also handled appeals when a pupil disagreed with the school board's decision regarding comparability of courses, satisfaction of high school graduation requirements or the number of high school credits to be awarded. To date there have been 9 appeals, of which two were withdrawn, 3 were upheld in favor of the pupil, 1 was upheld for 3 of 5 courses requested, and 3 were denied.

The comments/suggestions section of the school district ... survey provided revealing qualitative data about the school districts' perception of the program. Every comment is included in the summary document. The responses are broken down into categories that indicate either support of, or concerns with, the PSEO program. Several responses were especially revealing and are offered below:

"The Post Secondary Enrollment Options program provided an opportunity for a variety of students to participate in various courses offered at institutions of higher education throughout the Fox River Valley. Students were able to begin work in vocational and technical areas that they were interested in pursuing following their high school graduation."

"Parents are realizing an opportunity to have their student experience a head start on post secondary education at a financial savings to them."

"This legislation provided students with a resource to pursue courses in math and music that extended beyond our curriculum and which were not economical for us to offer. It also enabled us to place a special education student at North Central Technical College in a transitional program that established his readiness to pursue higher education."

"PSEO is not very practical in our district. We are at least 30 miles from any post secondary institution and students would lose two class hours just in traveling time."

"Students in rural areas have a transportation problem." In addition, the travel time cuts into the school day too JOURNAL OF THE ASSEMBLY [January 12, 1994]

much. (A student would have to take off 1/2 day of school to participate and receive credit for one class.)

"The law as written causes the school district to pay the cost of post high school education for the student. This is not fair to the taxpayers of the district."

This report begins to establish initial trends about PSEO and serves as a foundation of information to enable educators, parents, taxpayers, and government officials to make better informed decisions about meeting the educational needs of our children. The department will continue to gather and record anecdotal information about PSEO in order to further assess program effectiveness. It is recommended that after one more year of program implementation, the department conduct a review of all existing evaluation data to determine if additional statutory or rule changes will be needed. Additional specific data analysis is available upon request by contacting Ken Brittingham at 266-2829.

Wisconsin has a rich tradition of excellence in public education, yet we must continuously strive to improve if we are to meet the many challenges that face us. My hope is that this report will help us in this collective effort as we pursue educational excellence for all children in Wisconsin.
