To the Honorable the Legislature:

We have completed an evaluation of the State's special needs adoption program, as directed by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee. While most adoptions are facilitated by private agencies, the Department of Health and Social Services facilitates most of the adoptions of children with special needs, who are considered more difficult to place. These children are ten years of age or older, are members of sibling groups of three or more who must be placed together, are members of minority groups, or have disabilities.

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Although the number of families expressing an interest in special needs adoption is currently larger than the Department's caseload of children, the Department has not promptly completed reviews of family eligibility. As a result, children are not placed as promptly as possible, and some families become frustrated and discouraged. In November 1993, staff in the Department's regional offices reported that 107 children were in need of placement and 218 families were awaiting eligibility review, 45 percent of the families had been waiting at least 11 months.

Because of the unique needs of children and applicant families, prompt matches are not possible in all cases. However, we have identified a number of management changes the Department can implement to increase the pool of approved families more rapidly, thereby increasing the likelihood of more prompt placements. These include improved case management and clear statewide policies for prompt eligibility determination.

We also found that the potential exists to successfully contract out a portion of special needs adoption services. In a 1989-1991 pilot project, cost per placement and placements per staff person were similar for both contracted agencies and state staff. If future contracts are structured to incorporate the lessons learned from the pilot project, privatization could be a viable option to a solely state-operated program.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by department staff at the central and regional offices and by experts in the adoption field with whom we spoke. The Department's response is Appendix II.

1991 Wisconsin Act 39 included the following provision:

SECTION 9145. Nonstatutory provisions; public instruction.

(7f) COMPULSORY SCHOOL ATTENDANCE; STUDY. The state superintendent of public instruction and the state director of vocational, technical and adult education shall jointly analyze and evaluate the educational and fiscal effects of the changes made to the compulsory school attendance law under section 118.15 of the statutes of this act, and shall report their findings and recommendations to the chief clerk of each house of the legislature, for distribution in the manner provided under section 13.172 (2) of the statutes by January-1,-1994. –

To the Honorable the Legislature:

This report is transmitted as required by sec. 20.002(11)(f) of the Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under sec. 13.172(3) Stats.), and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative balances during the month of April, 1994.

On April 1, 1994 the <u>Health Insurance Risk Fund</u> balance was negative three thousand dollars (-\$3,000). This shortfall continued through April 30, 1994. The shortfall is due to the timing of revenues to the fund.

On April 1, 1994 the <u>Lottery Fund</u> balance was negative one million dollars (-\$1,000,000). This shortfall continued until April 21, 1994 when the balance reached one million dollars (\$1,000,000). The shortfall was due to lower than expected revenues for fiscal year 1994.

On April 14, 1994 the <u>University Trust-Principal Fund</u> balance was negative sixty four thousand dollars (-\$64,000). This shortfall continued until April 18, 1994 when the balance reached one million two hundred thousand dollars (\$1,200,000). The shortfall was due to a delay in transfers to the fund.

The Health Insurance Risk Fund, Lottery Fund and University Trust-Principal Fund shortfalls were not in excess of the \$400 million ceiling and did not exceed the balances of the Funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by State Finance will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority.
