To the Honorable the Legislature:

Pursuant to 1989 Wisconsin Act 186, s. 36.12 (3)(a)(b), Wisconsin Statutes, the Board is required to submit a report to the chief clerk of each house of the legislature on the number of complaints received from students alleging discrimination at each technical college and the disposition of each such complaint. Also to be reported are the numbers of requests for review received by the Board and the dispositions of each such request.

The enclosed report shows the total number of complaints received by each institution broken down by numbers and types of alleged discrimination followed by the disposition of each complaint.

A total of 75 complaints were received during the academic year (1993-94). Of that number 47 have been resolved or were dropped by the student filing the complaint; in 13 others there was no discrimination found; 8 cases resulted in discipline; and 7 are pending.

The Wisconsin Technical College System Board has not received any requests for review.

To the Honorable the Legislature:

Wisconsin Act 122 of 1989 made funds available to the Department of Public Instruction (DPI) to enable and encourage public schools to develop comprehensive programs to prevent or ameliorate alcohol and other drug abuse (AODA) among minors. The Act created, or expanded, funding for five grant programs which the department administered during the 1992-93 and 1993-94 school years.

The Department was required to collect and analyze information about the programs funded through the Act and to evaluate their effectiveness. The enclosed final report provides a comprehensive examination of the grants administered by the department. A preliminary report was submitted on June 30 that established a foundation for the reader to critically examine the findings of the final report.
