As required by s. 119.23, Wis. Stat., enclosed for distribution to the appropriate standing committees is the second—year report on the Milwaukee Parental Choice Program. Prepared by John Witte, professor with The Robert M. La Follette Institute of Public Affairs and the Department of Political Science of the University of Wisconsin—Madison, the report is comprehensive, pointing out both positive and negative aspects of the program. Witte repeats his first—year report recommendations for improvement of the program, which require legislative approval and have been advanced by this department, as part of its biennial budget request.

Among the findings of the report are the following:

- * The vast majority of evidence presented in the report is consistent with and confirms the evidence presented in the first-year report.
- * The program accomplishes its intent of making alternative school choices available to low-income families.
- * The number of students participating has increased each year, from 341 in fall 1990, to 521 in fall 1991, to 613 in fall 1992.
- * The number of participating schools was seven in 1990-91, six in 1991-92, and 11 in 1992-93.
- * The attrition rate remains high into the third year of the program. Excluding graduates, there was an attrition rate from choice schools of 47 percent between the first and second years, which means that, of the original 341 students, excluding eight graduates, only 53 percent returned the second year. The second-year attrition rate was 35 percent.
- * Pupil attendance in the choice schools is high, but only slightly higher than MPS. Attendance by choice students (excluding SER-Jobs) averaged 94 percent in 1990-91 and xx percent in 1991-92. Average attendance in MPS elementary schools in the last three years has been 92 percent each year.
- * Test scores of choice students, whether completing one or two years in the program, are lower than the scores in both the full MPS sample and the low-income MPS sample. Comparing low-income MPS and choice students, the mean math scores of the choice students is more than five points lower. The reading score for the choice students, which was higher in 1991, is two points lower than the MPS sample.
- * Parent satisfaction is high.
- * Parents reported high satisfaction with information and assistance received from choice schools and the Department of Public Instruction.
- * Staff turnover during the first two years of the program was high, but turnover and new personnel rates for the current year are down substantially, indicating some stability in the original five schools.
- * Turnover of administrators was also high. For 1991-92, three of the six participating schools had new principals or directors.
- * Parental involvement for choice schools is high.
- * At an estimated \$2,745 per pupil in 1992-93, state aid to private voucher schools is higher than per-pupil equalization aid paid to 66 percent of public school districts.
- * The per-pupil payment by the state to the choice schools is higher than the tuition at all but one of the choice schools.
- * Choice schools continuing in the program for the third year seem to have reached a level of stability, and it appears one of the contributing factors is the public dollars to the schools.
- * The recommendations in the report are similar to those in the first-year report and highlight needed changes in governance, financial reporting,

program accountability, information and selection procedures, transportation, and the exclusion of children with exceptional education needs, among others.

The Department of Public Instruction budget request includes Professor Witte's first-year recommendations for improvements to this experimental program. Our proposal also includes the sunset provision, which was vetoed from the original legislation to reinforce the experimental nature of private school choice and to require affirmative action on the part of the legislature to continue the program.

I continue to oppose this program, but as the report notes, our department has administered the program fairly and professionally. I believe this report provides continued evidence that a private school choice program is not a panacea, nor does it deal directly or substantially with the challenges faced by the Milwaukee Public Schools.
