To the Honorable the Legislature:

As required by s. 115.38, Wis. Stat., enclosed is the first statewide School Performance Report. The law requires school districts to prepare and distribute to parents and guardians an annual school performance report by January 1. It also requires the State Superintendent to prepare a summary of the district reports and submit it to the Legislature. The "report card" mandate calls for information on the following to be included in the report:

- \* Attendance
- Suspensions
- \* Dropouts
- \* Retentions
- \* Expulsions
- \* Extra/co-curricular and community activities
- \* Graduation rates
- \* Postgraduation follow-up
- \* Assessment test results (Advanced Placement participation, Third Grade Reading Tests results, and ACT results)

Districts can choose to report other information as well. To provide a broader perspective, the Department of Public Instruction elected to add fiscal, staffing, enrollments in advanced course work, and graduation requirements. Even so, this report should be considered as a beginning point.

Although the data and statistics are important in providing a snapshot of education in Wisconsin during a particular point in time, the true value of the School Performance Report will be as a tool. It was designed to provide an open and candid view of the state's public schools in order to dispel myths, expose problems, and find solutions.

As a first report, it leaves gaps. There are anomalies in these data that have not been fully resolved because of time constraints, yet the report as a whole provides meaningful trends and lays the groundwork for future reports that will include more outcome measures and thus enable educators, parents, taxpayers, and government officials to make better—informed decisions about meeting the educational needs of our children.

Wisconsin has a tradition of excellence in public education, but we must continuously improve if we are to meet the challenges that lie before us. My hope is that this report will help us in this collective effort as we pursue educational excellence for all children in Wisconsin.
