State of Wisconsin Department of Justice

To the Honorable the Legislature:

Section 165.90 of the Wisconsin Statutes requires the Department of Justice to submit an annual report on the progress of county-tribal law enforcement programs which are funded under this section. This letter constitutes the report for 1992.

In 1992, 14 counties submitted requests for county-tribal law enforcement funding, totalling \$966,502. A total of \$614,200 was provided to 13 counties through a series of awards. This amount was awarded based upon the revenue available and the desire to sustain a stable funding level in future years. All of the counties received as much or more than they received in the prior year.

To the Honorable the Legislature:

We have completed an evaluation of state agency efforts to coordinate alcohol and other drug abuse (AODA) programs and collected information on all state and federally funded AODA programs, as directed by 1989 Wisconsin Act 122. In fiscal year 1992–93, state agencies are operating at least 156 AODA programs, with a total budget of \$141.4 million. Most services are delivered at the local level, through governmental agencies or through private providers.

Given the magnitude and pervasiveness of the AODA problem, state agencies need to work together to use available resources as effectively as possible. While program information is exchanged among state agencies, efforts to coordinate planning, program development, and funding have been limited. Few programs have been evaluated. As a result, multiple programs provide similar services to the same client group without the coordination needed to avoid duplication.

We do not believe it would be practical to establish a single state agency to control all AODA programs. However, we do believe a strengthened State Council on Alcohol and other Drug Abuse could improve coordination and help to avoid duplication. A State Council whose membership included more representatives of criminal justice interests, as well as some citizen members, could be assigned responsibility for developing an overall state AODA strategy, reviewing agency program and funding proposals, and monitoring AODA programs for consistency with overall state goals.

The appendices to this report describe activities and funding of 15 state agencies involved in AODA programs. Agency efforts have been characterized as either education and prevention, treatment, or law enforcement; program descriptions include information on providers and participants.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by the many state agency staff who assisted in the development of this report.

State of Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources January 28, 1993

To the Honorable the Legislature:

The Department of Natural Resources recently received a copy of the State Historical Society's report on the transfer of First Capitol State park. In light of the fact 1991 Wisconsin Act 39 (as modified through veto by Governor Thompson) required a *joint report* "containing a plan for the transfer of the property...", we would like to take this opportunity to comment and respond.

In the Spring 1992, the DNR made a commitment—as recommended by the Historic Sites Task Force—to expend approximately \$69,200 for the following projects at First Capitol State park in anticipation of the property transfer: paint the Council House and Supreme Court, repair the walkways and ramps, and replace the toilets. The first two projects were completed in the summer of 1992, the toilet project will be completed in 1993. Completion of these projects will fulfill our responsibilities in respect to pre-transfer obligations.

However, the SHSW has identified several other projects it would like to be addressed before transfer. In many of these cases, the DNR has responded to SHSW concerns and has provided additional funds and staff time to make the requested repairs.

We believe we have more than fulfilled our obligations regarding this property. Therefore, we plan to make the transfer of the property on July 1, 1993, as per the statutory deadline; we do not feel that any delay is necessary. We will be happy to work with the SHSW on any transitional issues that arise, and will make every effort to ensure that this process is as smooth as possible.

I suggest we meet in the near future to discuss these issues and begin the transition process. We will contact you soon in order to coordinate such a meeting.
