Last December, you received a letter from past DNR Secretary Buzz Besadny regarding the status of feasibility and economic impact studies to reopen the Portage Canal and reconstruct Fort Winnebago. Funds were provided to both the City of Portage and DNR in **1991 Senate Bill 483** to do these studies, along with a requirement that we provide you with the economic impact portion of the studies by December 31, 1992. The December letter indicated that the consultant hired by the City for this project had informed them that the studies would not be completed until January 31, 1993. I am writing to inform you that the consultant has still not completed the studies.

The Mayor of Portage has appointed a steering committee to work with the consultant, and this committee has had numerous meetings and discussions with the consultant. A member of my staff (Doug Fendry) is an ex officio member of the steering

committee. The steering committee last met with the consultant on March 26, and provided him with the list of items that are needed to complete the studies.
