To the Honorable the Legislature:

Pursuant to s. 710.02(4)(b), Stats., as amended by 1989 Wisconsin Act 31, I am pleased to submit to the senate the attached reports entitled "Status of Alien Land Ownership in the State of Wisconsin, January 1, 1992" and "Status of Alien Land Ownership in the State of Wisconsin, January 1, 1993."

Under s. 710.02(4)(a), Stats., DATCP must annually submit this report to the chief clerk of each house of the legislature for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under s. 13.172(3), Stats. The report summarizes information received under s.710.02(4)(a), Stats.

Under s. 710.02(4)(a), Stats., all foreign persons (including individuals, corporations, companies, firms, partnerships, trusts, and any other legal entity) who acquire or transfer land in Wisconsin must submit a report to DATCP not later than .90 days after the date of acquisition or transfer. The same report must also be filed under federal law, under 7 USC 3501 to 3508. Aliens initially file the ASCS-153 forms with their county ASCS office, the reports are then forwarded to Washington, DC, to be verified and recorded before they are filed with DATCP.

The attached reports summarizes ownership of Wisconsin land as of January 1, 1992 and January 1, 1993 and purchases during the 1991 and 1992 calendar years. Enclosed is a copy of the Wisconsin Acid Deposition Research Council Third Biennial Report: A Status Report of Acid Rain Research in Wisconsin which was originally filed in July 1992 pursuant to 1985 Wisconsin Act 296. This report summarizes the results of the Council's six—year effort, emphasizing the last two years and outlining the role of acid rain research in the future.

The Wisconsin Acid Deposition Research Council was created by 1985 Wisconsin Act 296 and is attached to the Department of Administration. The Council was

impaneled in May of 1986 and its seven members represent industry, electric utilities, environmental organizations, academia, and state government.

As the 1992 Biennial Report indicates, Wisconsin continues to lead the nation in acid deposition policy, research and monitoring activities. As we approach the 1993 compliance date for the fifty percent reduction of sulfur dioxide emissions, the Council's major emphasis will be to assess the effectiveness of that reduction and to address any remaining research issues and concerns. The Council believes that long term monitoring will be required to fully evaluate the benefits to the environment and to the overall quality of life for Wisconsin's citizens.
