I am pleased to transmit my 1994 Overcharge Plan for consideration by the Joint Committee on Finance at the next s.13.10 meeting. As required by Wisconsin Statute 14.065. I am also forwarding copies to the Co-Chairs of the Joint Committee on Finance for their consideration at their next s.13.10 meeting.

This plan allocates \$1,613,398 plus interest of Stripper XIV Oil Overcharge monies received from the U.S. Department of Energy. Oil Overcharge monies must be used on energy programs that provide restitution to Wisconsin citizens.

In addition to Joint Finance's action, the U. S. Department of Energy and the Federal Courts must also conduct a review to determine if Wisconsin's Plan conforms with established definitions of restitution.

The Department of Administration staff will be available to provide additional information that may be required.

To the Honorable, the Senate: I have approved Senate Bill 533 as 1993 Act 76 and have deposited it in the Office of the Secretary of State. I have exercised the partial veto in Section 2.

Senate Bill 533 creates an appropriation to pay fees charged by the federal government under the federal Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1993 for the administration of the state's supplement to the federal supplemental security income (SSI) program. creating this appropriation, the state can begin to pay the required federal administrative fees with minimal accrued interest charges.

Section 2 also requires the Department of Health and Social Services (DHSS) to study the feasibility of the state administering its own program and report its findings to the Joint Committee on Finance by March 1, 1994. In addition, if the study concludes that this is the most cost-effective option, the department is to submit proposed legislation along with the report. Because it is unlikely that it will be cost-effective to take over the administration of the state supplement program prior to Federal Fiscal Year 1995-96, when the administrative fee increases to \$5.00 per case per month, the March 1, 1994 deadline creates an unnecessarily tight time frame for DHSS to complete potential legislation. The bill as originally drafted required the department to submit its report no later than July 1, 1994 with the intent that any necessary legislation could then be drafted and included in the 1995-97 biennial budget. Because the enrolled bill does not give DHSS sufficient time to propose legislation that would address potentially not only administrative issues but policy issues as well, I am using the partial veto to remove the requirement that proposed legislation be submitted along with the report. This will give DHSS the opportunity to draft necessary legislation in a deliberate manner for the 1995-97 budget while providing the Legislature with the study results on March 1, 1994, as desired by the Legislature.
