This report is transmitted as required by sec. 20.002(11)(f) of the Wisconsin Statutes, (for distribution to the appropriate standing committees under sec. 13.172(3) Stats.), and confirms that the Department of Administration has found it necessary to exercise the "temporary reallocation of balances" authority provided by this section in order to meet payment responsibilities and cover resulting negative balances during the month of November, 1993.

On November 4, 1993 the Variable Retirement Fund balance was \$-2.8 million. This shortfall continued through November 30, 1993 when the balance was \$-1.9 million. The shortfall is due to a temporary delay in cash transfers to the fund.

The Variable Retirement Fund shortfall was not in excess of the \$400 million ceiling and did not exceed the balances of the Funds available for interfund borrowing.

The distribution of interest earnings to investment pool participants is based on the average daily balance in the pool and each fund's share. Therefore, the monthly calculation by State Finance will automatically reflect the use of these temporary reallocations of balance authority.

We have completed an audit of the dental education contract between the state and the Marquette University School of Dentistry for the 1991-93 biennium as required by s. 39.15, Wis. Stats. State funds paid to the School of Dentistry for tuition aids totaled \$1,880,750 for the biennium.

Our audit included tests to ensure that the Marquette University School of Dentistry has complied with statutory requirements set forth in s. 39.46, Wis. Stats. This included reviewing the residency certification and enrollment status of students claimed for tuition aids, the admissions preference given to Wisconsin residents, and the promotion of minority student access. We found that the School of Dentistry was in compliance with s. 39.46, Wis. Stats., and the state funds were expended only for the undergraduate dental school program.

The audit report includes no major findings, conclusions, or recommendations, and in our judgment, is not likely to be of interest to most members of the Legislature.

To the Honorable the Legislature:

We have completed an evaluation of Wisconsin's adoption search program, as directed by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee. We evaluated the Department of Health and Social Services' management of the program to determine the causes of, and solutions to, the program's extensive backlog of applications for information.

While most adoption records in Wisconsin are confidential, the statutes allow adult adoptees and, in some cases, adoptive parents access to certain information, such as medical and genetic information; non-identifying social history; and, with the permission of birth parents, the names and locations of birth parents. However, the Department currently informs applicants that they must wait approximately two years for non-emergency information because of an extensive backlog of applications. The Department closed approximately 222 cases last year and estimates its backlog is approximately 400 cases.

Our audit indicates the backlog and slowness in processing applications are due largely to inefficient program procedures and a lack of management direction to program staff. Our report includes detailed recommendations for the Department to establish clear policies governing the program, streamline currently inefficient procedures, and eliminate inefficient record-keeping systems. Department staff have begun implementing these management recommendations.

To assess the potential for improving service or lowering cost through privatizing search services, we surveyed other states and discussed privatization with Wisconsin adoption agencies. Our report includes a number of options to restructure the range of services provided and the methods of delivery.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by department staff and representatives of the private adoption agencies we contacted. The Department's response is the appendix.
