To the Honorable the Legislature:

We have completed an evaluation of the provision of specialized medical vehicle transportation to Medical Assistance recipients, as directed by 1993 Wisconsin Act 16. In fiscal year 1992-93, the state's Medical Assistance program spent \$26.4 million on specialized medical vehicle transportation, \$10.5 million of which was state general purpose revenue.

Specialized medical vehicle transportation is intended for individuals who use wheelchairs, have trouble walking, or have cognitive or behavioral problems and require special assistance to travel to medical care. Expenditures for specialized transportation increased by \$14.6 million (123.7 percent) over the past four years. This growth was caused by an increase of 6,614 (83.2 percent) in average monthly users and a 2.5 mile increase in the average length of trips.

To some extent, an increase in the number of providers may have also contributed to the growth in specialized transportation use. Between June 1988 and June 1992, the number of providers grew from 141 to 295.

To address the growth in expenditures, the Department of Health and Social Services, which administers the Medical Assistance program, made some programmatic changes in April 1993. Although the changes had some effect on slowing the growth in specialized medical vehicle expenditures, additional standards for vehicle equipment, limiting reimbursement when more than one individual is transported at the same time, and requiring prior authorization for long trips may also help control expenditures.

We also include a recommendation that the Department contract with brokers to obtain the most cost-effective transportation for individuals who are elderly or disabled and need transportation to medical and other activities. Such a system has reduced costs in other states.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by staff of the Department of Health and Social Services. The Department's response is the appendix.

To the Honorable the Legislature:

The biennial budget bill, 1983 Wisconsin Act 27, enacted s. 46.275, Community Integration Program (CIP) for Residents of State Centers. The intent of this program "is to relocate persons from the state centers for the developmentally disabled into appropriate community settings with the assistance of home and community-based services and with continuity of care. The intent of the program is also to minimize its impact on state employees through redeployment of employees into vacant positions." S. 46.275(5m) requires the Department to submit a report to the Joint Committee on Finance and to the Chief Clerk of each house of the Legislature describing the program's impact during the preceding calendar year on state employees, including the Department's efforts to redeploy employees into vacant positions and the number of employees laid off.

For the period of January 1, 1993 to December 31, 1993, there were 57 CIP placements, 3 CIP returnees, and 4 CIP diversions. For fiscal year 1993, reductions of \$1,073,682 and 51 FTE were made in the budget for the purpose of CIP placements. For the period July 1, 1993 through December 31, 1993, sufficient reductions will be made in the fiscal year 1994 operating budget to reflect reductions for CIP placements. Reductions of positions and dollars have been made for calendar year 1993 with no layoff of employees.

To the Honorable the Legislature:

1991 Wisconsin Act 250 and 1993 Wisconsin Act 16 directed three studies recently completed by the Office of the Commissioner of Insurance:

- * Unique Patient Identification Number
- * Health Insurance Identification Cards
- * Standardization of Insurance Information

The enclosed reports address different but related aspects of standardization in the health care market. For this reason they are being transmitted together.

A preliminary draft of the report on a unique patient identifier was sent to the legislature last year. This is the final draft of that study. The other two studies were required by Act 16.

Wisconsin was among the first states to require providers to issue and insurers to accept standard paper forms for the filing and payment of claims. Implementing the recommendations in the enclosed studies will help assure that Wisconsin continues to be a leader in encouraging standardization in the health care marketplace and in promoting cost containment efforts.

Recently there has been considerable discussion nationally on the "information highway" of the future. It will not be very long before transactions in all aspects of our lives will be conducted electronically on a national or international basis. Health care transactions will be part of this new electronic world.

Before health care information can be successfully transmitted and exchanged electronically several steps are necessary. Three of the most important steps are:

- * Developing a network through which providers and insurers can transmit and exchange information. The success of the network depends not only on the development of appropriate technology but, even more importantly, on the standardization of the information being transmitted.
- * Facilitating access to the network through the development of standardized patient identification cards.
- * Establishing unique numbers by which providers, patients, and payers can be identified.

As discussed in each of the attached reports The Workgroup on Electronic Data Interchange (WEDI) established in 1991 by Dr. Louis Sullivan, former Secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services, has been the prime mover in furthering the development of an electronic network for health care. WEDI has looked to the American National Standards Institute (ANSI) ASC X12 Committee as a source for the standards which WEDI recommends. The National

Association of Insurance Commissioners (NAIC) is encouraging states to adopt model laws and regulations relating to electronic data interchange.

By asking the Office of the Commissioner of Insurance to study issues of standardization in health care, the Wisconsin legislature has demonstrated its interest in ensuring that Wisconsin remains a leader in this area. The reports can help legislators and other interested parties understand the current standardization efforts and can point toward future initiatives for both the public and private sectors. Each of the reports contains several recommendations. Overall, these recommendations illustrate the benefits of increased standardization.

Reducing administrative costs and increasing efficiency in the health care market will continue to be a focus of the Insurance Commissioner's office. We intend to monitor private and public sector initiatives at the state and national level and participate in discussions at the NAIC and WEDI.

We are not proposing any administrative rules at this time. However, we anticipate that over the next year we will propose rules to increase the standardization in insurance and health care transactions.

I would appreciate comments on any of the reports and look forward to working with you to improve the health care market in Wisconsin.

Please let me know if you would like to discuss any of these issues further.

Pursuant to the requirements of section 153.35(1), Wis. Stat., I am pleased to submit to the Governor and to the Legislature the fourth annual *Health Care Data Report*. This report is based on hospital inpatient discharge data reported to the Office of Health Care Information by all general medical-surgical and specialty hospitals operating in Wisconsin from January through December 1992. It also contains selected outpatient surgery utilization and charge data from general medical-surgical hospitals and freestanding ambulatory surgery centers in Wisconsin during the same period.

The report fulfills the statutory requirement to report "*in a manner that permits comparisons among hospitals ... the charges for up to 100 health care services or diagnostic-related groups selected by the office.*"

To the Honorable the Legislature:

In compliance with Section 119(5) of the 1989 Wisconsin Act 366, the Department is transmitting our Clean Drinking Water Revolving Loan Program report. The statute directed the Department to study the need for establishing a revolving loan program to assist municipalities to comply with safe drinking water standards. Further, the results of the study are to be submitted to the chief clerk of each house of the legislature for distribution to the legislature in the manner provided in section 13.172(2) of the statutes.

The Department strongly recommends that we take advantage of the federal grant funding expected to be available to help states establish a revolving loan program for drinking water projects. Municipal water systems in Wisconsin are facing two major challenges that will require substantial capital expenditures over the next 4 to 6 years. At the federal level, the U.S. EPA is planning to put in place over 50 new contaminant standards that will have to be met by all municipal water systems in Wisconsin. While the impact will vary from system to system, major treatment process changes or additions will be required for many water systems. For those water systems that use surface water, the recent Cryptosporidium emergency in southeastern Wisconsin has highlighted the vulnerability of these systems to contamination. The Department is conducting an intensive study of cryptosporidium and other microbiological contaminants in the surface waters used by these 20 systems. The results of this study, expected to be completed in the spring of 1995, and the additional standards and treatment requirements expected from the U.S. EPA are likely to also require major treatment process changes for these water systems.

We are ready to provide any additional information or clarifications requested. We will also continue to monitor U.S. EPA rule-making efforts for the new drinking water standards and congressional actions on the proposed federal grant funding for state drinking water revolving loan programs.
