We have completed a financial and compliance audit of the State of Wisconsin as requested by state agencies to meet the audit requirements of the Single Audit Act of 1984 and provisions of the federal Office of Management and Budget Circular A-128. Our audit covers the period July 1, 1992 through June 30, 1993. In addition to satisfying audit requirements, the single audit assists us in meeting state audit requirements under section 13.94, Wis. Stats.

Report 94-12 contains the auditor's reports on internal control structure and compliance; findings of noncompliance with federal requirements and results of our follow up to prior audit findings; agencies' responses to our recommendations and their plans for corrective action; and the Schedules of Federal Financial Assistance and accompanying notes. We have identified \$114,779 in questioned costs, plus an additional, undertermined amount of questioned costs.

Our audit opinion on the State's financial statements was included in the comprehensive Annual Financial report for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1993. This report was published by the Department of Administration in May 1994 and is available from the Bureau of Financial Operations in hte Department of Administration. Our opinion was qualified because we were unable to determine the fair presentation of interfund transactions and other receivables and payables.

Our single audit report is lengthy and detailed. We are, therefore, limiting our initial distribution to those persons require by law to receive copies and to those who have an obvious and direct interest in our detailed findings. Wisconsin Act 122 of 1989 provided the Department of Health and Social Services with funding to establish Intensive Aftercare Pilots. The Pilots were used to provide intensive supervision to juveniles upon their release from child care institutions or from the Department's two secure juvenile correctional institution. Pilot participants were to be provided with daily face-to-face contacts, educational services and other programming as appropriate for a minimum of 90 days. The Department awarded grants to four single county Pilots in Kenosha, Racine, Rock and Waukesha counties, and also funded a combined county Pilot in Vilas and Oneida counties.

The enabling legislation directed the Department to conduct an evaluation fo the Pilots. The attached report is intended to meet this reporting mandate. This report includes information on the recidivism experiences of participants within one year of termination from Intensive Aftercare supervision. The Department also issued an interim report in January, 1993 which summarized the per capita costs of the program, the types of programs and services provided to participants and participants' outcomes, including arrests and recidivism, during Intensive Aftercare supervision.

Wisconsin Act 122 of 1989 made funds available to the Department of Public Instruction (DPI) to enable and encourage public schools to develop comprehensive programs to prevent or ameliorate alcohol and other drug abuse (AODA) among minors. the most recent

biennial budget bill has allowed these grant programs to continue supporting schools' efforts.

The Department was required to collect and analyze information about the programs funded through the Act and to evaluate their effectiveness. the enclosed preliminary report provides an overview of the programs administered by the department, the research that supports them as effective prevention or intervention strategies, and the emerging themes from numerous interviews conducted with project staff and participants. This report is being submitted as an interim report as many grant funded projects were not completed until June 30th and therefore complete and accurate information about those projects could not be provided at this time. You will note that tables have been set up to display the data from the just completed projects once it has been analyzed. A final report inclusive of data analysis, summary, and recommendations regarding these grants will be submitted by September 1, 1994. This preliminary report also provides a foundation for the reader upon which to critically examine the findings of the final report.
