Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

Currently, there is no requirement that antique dealers and recyclers keep records of people that sell or donate, to the dealer or recycler, used home furnishings, such as windows, radiators, cabinets, bookcases, mantels, staircases and other items from a home.

This bill provides that the dealers and recyclers must keep records on the person that sells or gives the materials to them. The records must include the person's name and address, identification such as a driver's license number, and if appropriate or available, information on the vehicle used to deliver the materials and the address of the building from which the materials were removed. The bill also provides penalties for people that violate the provisions. The penalties are not less than \$100 or more than \$1,000 for the first offense, and not less than \$500 or more than \$3,000 for subsequent offenses.

This bill is likely to increase costs for local units of government. The increased costs will be a result of local government officials issuing the citations to dealers or recyclers that do not adhere to the provisions in this bill. The fiscal effect of this bill is indeterminable. It is not possible to determine the number of violations that will occur or the costs associated with serving the citations. Also, it is not possible to determine the total value of penalties that will be imposed because of the unknown number of violations and the range of the amount of the penalties that can be imposed.

In response to your request, I write this memo to inform you that in my opinion, the list of numbers contained in section 134.695 (2) (b) are not cumulative. This is evident by the use of the word "or" instead of the word "and". In other words, an antique dealer or recycler must only obtain one of those numbers from the person selling the used home furnishings. "All of the following" in the introduction means that the antique dealer or recycler must record the information under paragraphs (a), (b), (c) and (d). However, within par. (b) the antique dealer or recycler need only record one of those numbers. To interpret paragraph (b) otherwise would lead to an impossible result. No person could have all of these numbers since no person can have a valid passport number and a valid alien registration card number. Only citizens can have the former, and only noncitizens can have the latter.

Re: Senate Bill 35

Goodwill Industries of Southeastern Wisconsin has reviewed SB-35 to determine what affect the legislation may have on not-for-profit corporations like us, Salvation Army, or St. Vincent DePaul Society, and others.

As you may know, four Goodwill affiliates headquartered in Madison, Milwaukee, Menasha and Marinette operate recycling/reuse programs throughout Wisconsin. Most materials that we receive are donated to us, but on occasion we may purchase items for resale. Materials received are primarily sold in our stores, but we also sell reusable or recyclable materials on the secondary market, many to developing nations.


Our analysis of SB-35 concludes that the bill as written would probably require Goodwill and other not-for-profit organizations to keep new records or other documentation on all donations that might include "used home furnishings", even if we did not pay for these items.

Goodwill Industries understands the purpose of SB-35 and we laud the authors for seeking a remedy to the problems of home furnishings being stolen and then resold. We believe, however, that the language of SB-35 is overly broad and may include not-for-profit organizations that are not part of the problem. We therefore ask that the Assembly Committee on Consumer Affairs adopt an amendment to SB-35 that would make it clear that not-for-profit corporations are not covered by this legislation.

I have been asked by Goodwill Industries of Southeastern Wisconsin to review SB-35 to determine what affect it might have on nonprofit corporations like Goodwill or St. Vincent De Paul.

My analysis concludes that the bill as written would probably require that Goodwill and St. Vincent keep the new records on all their donations that might include "used home furnishings" even if they did not pay for these items. That is due to the bill using the word "receive".

Even without the word "receive", Goodwill and St. Vincent might need to keep these new records since on occasion they might actually pay something for an item.

I can understand the need for this legislation. However, I don't believe the problem that you are trying to solve involves nonprofit groups like Goodwill or St. Vincents.

I therefore would like to ask that you consider an amendment that would make it clear that nonprofit groups are not included in the definition of either "antique dealer" nor "recycler".

If this would be agreeable to you, I would be glad to work with the bill drafter, the Assembly Consumer Affairs Committee, and the full Assembly to see that this does not delay the bill.

SB35

This bill regulates the purchase of used home furnishings by antique dealers and recyclers. The bill provides that no antique dealer or recycler may purchase or receive used home furnishings from a person unless the antique dealer or recycler records the person's name and address, the number printed on certain kinds of personal identification, the registration plate numbers, if any, and other information relating to the motor vehicle, if any, delivering the used home furnishings and, if known by the person, the address of the home or other building from which the used home furnishings were removed. The bill also requires that the antique dealer or recycler maintain a record of this information for a period of not less than one year.

SUBJECT: 1997 Senate Bill 35, Relating to the Purchase of Used Home Furnishings by Antique Dealers and Recyclers and Providing a Penalty

This memorandum describes the provisions of 1997 Senate Bill 35. It also provides a brief legislative history and a description of two amendments adopted by the Assembly Committee on Consumer Affairs.

A. LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

Senate Bill 35 was introduced on January 29, 1997 by Senators Moore and Huelsman; cosponsored by Representatives Riley, Morris-Tatum, Krug, Bock, Notestein, Boyle, Freese, Otte, Olsen and Dobyms. The Bill was referred to the Senate Committee on Economic Development, Housing and Government Operations. Following a public hearing, the Bill was reported with the recommendation for passage on February 25, 1997 on a vote of Ayes, 5; Noes, 0.

The Bill was passed in the Senate on a voice vote on February 25, 1997.

Upon receipt in the Assembly, the Bill was referred to the Committee on Consumer Affairs. A public hearing was held by the Consumer Affairs Committee on March 27, 1997. At an executive session held on April 24, 1997, the Committee offered *Assembly Amendments 1 and 2*. The Committee adopted *Assembly Amendment 1* on a vote of Ayes, 7; Noes, 0 and adopted *Assembly Amendment 2* on a vote of Ayes, 6; Noes, 1. The Committee recommended concurrence as amended on a vote of Ayes, 5; Noes, 2. The legislation was referred to the Committee on Rules on May 6, 1997.

B. PROVISIONS OF ORIGINAL LEGISLATION

Senate Bill 35 regulates the purchase of used home furnishings by antique dealers and recyclers.

Senate Bill 35 provides that no antique dealer or recycler may purchase or receive used home furnishings from a person unless the antique dealer or recycler records the person's name and address, the number printed on certain kinds of personal identification, the registration plate numbers, if any, and other information related to the motor vehicle if any that is used to deliver the used home furnishings. The antique dealer or recycler must also record the address of the home or other building from which the used home furnishings were removed, if known by the person.

Senate Bill 35 also requires that the antique dealer or recycler maintain a record of this information for a period of not less than one year. The Bill provides a penalty for any person who violates the section of a forfeiture of not less than \$100 nor more than \$1,000 for the first offense, and a forfeiture of not less than \$500 nor more than \$3,000 upon conviction for a second or subsequent offense.

C. PROVISIONS CONTAINED IN ASSEMBLY AMENDMENT 1

Assembly Amendment 1 makes the following changes in the Senate Bill:

1. Requires that no antique dealer or recycler may *knowingly* purchase or receive used home furnishings from a person unless certain information is recorded. [Item 1. of Assembly Amendment 1.]

2. Requires the dealer or recycler to also obtain the signature of the person providing the used home furnishings. [Item 2.]

3. Clarifies that the information that must be collected relating to the motor vehicle by specifying that the dealer or recycler record *one* of the following identification numbers:

a. The person's motor vehicle operator's license number.

b. The person's state identification card number.

c. The person's military identification card number for the person's U.S. passport number.

d. The person's alien registration card number. The original legislation was not clear as to whether one or all of these identification numbers were required to be collected. [Item 3.]

4. Amends the motor vehicle recording requirements in s. 134.695 (2) (c), Stats., of the original Bill. That section, as amended, requires that the antique dealer or recycler record "The registration plate numbers and the color, make, model and year of any motor vehicle delivering

the used home furnishings to the antique dealer or recycler.” [See Items 4. and 5. of the Amendment.]

D. PROVISIONS OF ASSEMBLY AMENDMENT 2

Assembly Amendment 2 creates an exemption from the Bill for nonprofit organizations. Specifically, exemptions are granted under the definition of antique dealer and recycler for nonprofit organizations. The amendment defines “nonprofit organization” to mean an organization described in section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code which is exempt from federal income tax under section 501 (a) of the Internal Revenue Code. This amendment has the effect of exempting antique dealers and recyclers who are nonprofit organizations from complying with the requirements of the law regarding purchasing and receiving used home furnishings.







Soon you will hear testimony on SB 35, a bill which regulates the purchase of used home furnishings by antique dealers and recyclers. The City of Milwaukee supports this important legislation.

SB 35 is a needed response to a growing problem in Milwaukee and other Wisconsin communities with older housing stock. The problem is the trafficking in stolen used/antique home furnishings. Under the bill, no dealer could purchase or receive used home furnishings from an individual unless the dealer records the person's name address and other personal identification information. Additionally, the dealer must maintain a record of this information for one year.

This bill should not be taken as yet another cumbersome intrusion by the government into the workings of the marketplace. Milwaukee has seen incidents where thieves have stripped antique furnishings from abandoned homes and sold them to unsuspecting antique dealers. The safeguards included in SB 35 will help everyone except the people its designed to thwart: thieves who engage in this illegal activity.

On behalf of the Milwaukee Common Council, the Milwaukee Police Department, and the office of Mayor John Norquist, please vote "YES" on SB 35.

Aluminum doors are targets of thieves

9 homes on 1 block are victimized

When Pauline Smith returned home from her third-shift job early Tuesday morning, she realized something was missing.

It was her front door.

Someone had carefully unhinged the aluminum screen door during the night. In fact, eight other residents of the 2900 block of N. 27th St. soon learned they too had been victims of the door thieves.

"I'm accustomed to opening my screen door to get in and when I got home it was gone," Smith said. "I just can't believe this. It makes me concerned about safety."

Ald. George C. Butler said homes were stripped of aluminum siding routinely in the early spring, but thefts of doors was a new twist.

"This is absolutely driven by people wanting to sell the aluminum now that the price has increased," Butler said. "It's a new low. It's getting worse."

In all, six front screen doors and three side side doors were taken between Monday night and Tuesday morning, police said, calling the incident an uncommon event.

"This is asinine," said Vicki Bingham, a longtime resident of the block. "It just shows they (the thieves) are becoming more bodacious and have no fear."

Bingham called the door thefts "a slap in the face" for

many residents of the block who have been trying to care for their properties and beautify the area.

"The thieves have no regard for property or the replacement costs," she said. "I think this might be the last straw for some people who may decide to move out."

Smith, who has lived on the block about 15 years, is considering leaving the area as a result of the door theft and damages to a window the home sustained over a week ago.

Several homes on the block have had aluminum siding, window frames or copper pipes stolen in broad daylight.

Bingham said it's not uncommon to see people walking in broad daylight with garbage carts full of metal that has been taken from homes, Bingham explained.

Several residents, who asked that their names not be printed, speculated the doors and other metal parts are stolen to be sold at area scrap metal yards.

The going rate for a variety of "clean" aluminum products other than cans ranges between 20 and 50 cents per pound, according to several recycling centers and scrap yards in the Milwaukee area. Aluminum products that contain other metals go for much lower prices.

The price has gone up about 5 cents in the last six months

and is near normal levels. Company officials said the price for aluminum frequently fluctuates.

Seventh District police officials have assigned several officers to investigate and check with scrap yards for possible sale of stolen property. In addition, Butler's office, police and scrap yards are cooperating to reduce the purchase of stolen metal parts.

Butler, however, feels thieves should be charged with felonies because the damage and replacement costs to home owners could reach the thousands of dollars.

"Residents are upset and concerned," Butler said. "Many were sleeping when their doors were stolen. This makes them very nervous."

Bill would target scavengers Antique dealers would be required to keep purchase record

In an attempt to stop thieves from stealing home furnishings, State Sen. Gwendolynne S. Moore began writing legislation Tuesday that requires antique dealers to record information about people who sell them valuable goods.

The legislation would require buyers to record the license plate number, name and address of antique vendors. The bill also requires antique dealers to pay for the items with checks

to help create a paper trail. The Milwaukee Democrat said the bill will deter thieves by making it difficult to anonymously sell stolen items.

"It's just common sense," Moore said in a statement. "If a guy comes in with a beautiful carved oak door, offering to sell it at 10% of its value, you ask where he got it, and write down his truck license plate. Then if it turns out to be stolen, the cops have something to go on."

Moore's bill is a response to a recent Milwaukee Sentinel article about thieves who strip mantels, leaded glass and other furnishings in Milwaukee's older neighborhoods on the west and north sides. The article said the thefts not only are costly to homeowners but also make it harder to keep fragile central city neighborhoods alive.

The article said the stolen goods are sometimes bought by local antique dealers.

"The ornate details that make city housing so beautiful are being stripped off and sold to the suburbs, with devastating consequences for urban neighborhoods," Moore said. "This bill will help preserve unique urban buildings, will deter crime and will not interfere with legitimate antique dealing."

"This bill will prevent legitimate dealers from buying stolen goods cheaply and underselling the competition," Moore said.

H. Russell Zimmermann, a Milwaukee design consultant and preservationist, said Moore's bill wouldn't hurt legitimate dealers.

"I can't see anyone who would complain about it except for the crooks," Zimmermann said.

John Cleary, executive director

of Westside Conservation Co. said the bill would help deter some thefts. Westside is a nonprofit group that renovates old homes and sells them to lower income families.

"You know where the stuff is going," said Cleary. "You know who the fences are. Make them responsible."


Moore also plans to petition state legislatures in neighboring states to pass similar bills. They would prevent thieves from merely crossing state borders to anonymously sell their stolen goods, she said.

The bill will create similar requirements for recyclers, Moore said often buy stolen copper wire and radiators which are melted down as scrap metal.

Moore's proposal probably will be introduced in the autumn legislative session.

Memorandum

The Assembly Consumer Affairs committee will today hold an executive session on Senate Bill 35, relating to the purchase of used home furnishings by antique dealers and recyclers.

Discussion at the Thursday, March 27 public hearing for the bill prompted the drafting of two friendly amendments designed to clarify the legal responsibilities of antique dealers and recyclers and to exclude non-profit organizations from the bill's provisions. The two amendments are described in more detail below.

Amendments to Senate Bill 35

LRBa0399/1

This amendment clarifies what information is legally required of antique dealers and recyclers to record from sellers.

The amendment inserts the word "knowingly" at line 12 after the "may" to protect dealers from having to record information about items that people may just drop off at their premises.

The amendment requires the dealer to obtain the sellers' signature—this should provide further protection for the dealer and further aid police in tracking any stolen goods.

The amendment clarifies that dealer are required to record only one of the list of possible manners of identification.

The amendment also clarifies that registration plate numbers must be recorded.

LRBa0407/1

In response to the discussion at the public hearing and based on a request from Goodwill Industries of Southeastern Wisconsin, non-profit organizations are exempted from the provisions of this bill.
