ORDER OF THE STATE OF WISCONSIN NATURAL RESOURCES BOARD AMENDING AND CREATING RULES

The Natural Resources Board proposes an order that amends NR 10.01(3)(e)(intro.), 1. (intro.), (em), 10.06(8)(b), 11.13, and creates 10.01(3)(e)7,(em)3., 10.011, 10.09(2)(d), 10.104(5)(c). pertaining to deer hunting in Deer Management Unit 67A.

Section 1. <u>Deer bag limit</u> - allows for possession of antlerless deer taken under special permit issued in conjunction with the deer herd control hunt.

Section 2. Unit 67A regular gun deer season - establishes a either-sex gun deer season.

Sections 3 and 4. <u>Antlerless bow hunt</u> - restricts archers to antlerless deer only during the deer herd control hunt.

Section 5. <u>Deer herd control hunt</u> - establishes a deer herd control hunt during October 29 through November 2 in unit 67A.

Section 6. <u>Hunting hours</u> - Clarifies that hunting hours in effect during the regular gun deer season do not apply to the deer herd control hunt.

Special tags issued under this order are not valid unless the hunter enters the number of his or her license which authorizes deer hunting in the space provided on the tag prior to hunting

SECTION 9. NR 11.13 is amended to read:

NR 11.13 PUBLIC LANDS CLOSED AREA. The department may establish closed season areas or time periods closed to hunting by posting signs within the exterior limits of public hunting grounds, state wildlife areas and other state-owned or leased lands administered for wildlife management purposes by the department.

The emergency rule procedure, pursuant to s. 227.24, Stats., is necessary and justified in establishing rules to protect the public welfare. Deer are causing significant crop damage concerns in this Unit. It highly unlikely that the regular 1998 gun deer seasons will achieve the prescribed harvest of antlerless deer.

The foregoing rule was approved and adopted by the State of Wisconsin Natural Resources Board on May 27, 1998.

The rule shall take effect on October 1, 1998.

Rule Proposal

We recommend Natural Resources Board adoption of rule order WM-36-98(E) to address significant agricultural deer damage concerns in deer management unit 67A. It is unlikely that the regular hunting season framework will achieve the antierless harvest objective for this unit. This rule order provides additional hunting opportunity as follows:

1. Establishes a 4-day anticriess-only firearm deer hunt in Unit 67A during October 29-Nov 1 to coincide with the annual fall teachers convention. Similar deer hunts have proven successful in reducing antierless deer populations in other units in 1996 and 1997. Bowhunting will be allowed during this time period, but will be restricted to antierless only. The early archery season will be extended by 4 days and will end on the Thursday immediately preceding the regular gun deer season. Blaze orange clothing requirements will apply to all hunting activity in unit 67a, except waterfowl, during the 4 days.

2. Provides free antierless-only tags for 67A. Similar to 1997, these tags would be available all fall at license outlets throughout the unit, as well as, statewide at DNR offices. Hunters will be eligible for up to 3 permits with their archery license and another 3 permits with their gun

deer license.

3. Establishes an either-sex bag limit for the regular 9-day gun season in November.

Background

Concern about deer damage to agricultural crops has been intensifying in Marquette county and in particular in deer management unit 67A. This unit has experienced the highest level of crop damage of any unit in the state. In 1996, the appraised losses for 65 damage claims was \$250,900. Preliminary data suggest similar losses were experienced in 1997.

The Marquette County Farm Bureau has requested assistance in addressing the deer damage concerns. They have specifically endorsed a lowering of the current overwinter goal of 35 deer/mi². In addition, they have endorsed the provisions of the special deer herd control hunt outlined above. The Conservation Congress has also endorsed actions to reduce the current deer herd, but have not taken any official action on this proposal.

Public Comment

An informational open house will be held in Montello on May 19th from 4:30-9:30 p.m. A summary of the comments received will be presented at the Board meeting.

Environmental Analysis

These rule changes have been determined to be a Type III action under Chapter 150, Wis. Adm. Code, and no environmental analysis is required.

This emergency rule is needed to control deer populations that are significantly over goal levels in order to prevent substantial deer damage to agricultural lands and to minimize deer nuisance problems, thereby protecting the public peace, health, safety and welfare. Normal rule-making procedures will not allow the establishment of these changes by August 1. Failure to modify the rules will result in the failure to provide lumning opportunity and comply with administrative rules.

Dear Mr. Sommers:

Upon receiving a copy of your letter to Pat Kaiser, dated May 28, 1998, Secretary Meyer requested that I respond to the damage and Unit 67A issues that you bring up in your letter. First, Secretary Meyer wanted me to convey his thanks for your letter of support for the recent Board decision to have a special hunt in Deer Management Unit 67A. The DNR can understand your desire that this be expanded to other areas with high crop damage levels. In fact, when the dialogue began on this issue, Marquette County farmers advocated that deer management goals be reduced for Units 67A, 67B, 70E, 54C and 54A, and that all of these units have a special Zone T season this fall.

An open meeting on this issue was co-sponsored by the Marquette County Farm Bureau and the Marquette County Conservation Congress to get input on what they would recommend to the DNR. There were a variety of Conservation Congress, hunters and farmers from surrounding counties at this meeting, the gist was that there was support to do something in Unit 67A, but there was stiff opposition for any immediate action in those other units outside Unit 67A. Further action on this issue met with opposition at several stages, however, because of a strong presentation by Unit 67A farmers regarding the dire circumstances of their economic well-being, the Natural Resources Board approved the special hunt at the May Board meeting. Because there was not the strong local support for expanding this proposal to other units it was only approved for Unit 67A.

This is not to say that the door is closed for such efforts, though it would be impossible to expand this effort in 1998. At the end of this year the DNR will be scheduling regional meetings with stakeholders (including local farmer organizations) to assess the need and seek recommendations for revising overwinter goals. Status of overwinter goals is the most important criteria for deciding whether special Zone T seasons are held. We encourage you to sit in on the "Regional Task Force" meeting in your area once they begin. Pat Kaiser would be your local contact for finding out later this year when these meetings will be scheduled--they have not been organized as of yet.



As for your proposal that claims be tied to shooting permit performance, certainly there is a degree of that now with the claim eligibility requirement for compliance with the Shooting Permit Harvest Objective. As I understand your proposal, after accomplishment of this harvest the program would pay 100% of remaining losses. This proposal has merit. It ties claim payments to removal of deer. Such a proposal could work in situations where shooting permit effort was intensive, beginning in May, deer were accessible, and if access to deer were liberally allowed through night shooting after the deer go nocturnal due to the intensive disturbance. However, such a proposal would not be practical in all situations from both a safety and effort standpoint. The Department opposes allowing night shooting of deer under agricultural damage shooting permits because of human health and safety issues. At night a shooter cannot be sure of his or her target and what's beyond. There would be increased risk to public safety. Further, not all situations warrant shooting permits. The best abatement on high value crops with extensive damage losses is an 8 ft. high woven wire fence. Cost effectiveness is a critical consideration. It is cost effective to use shooting permits when losses are between \$1,000 and \$4,000. In many cases (but not all) annual losses over this range lend themselves to permanent woven wire fence abatement. Above this range extensive use of shooting permits begin to be workload intensive for the farmer, who tell us they are already over-extended.

The DNR can agree with you whole-heartedly that hunting is the most practical means of controlling local deer populations. As for the issue of farmer controlled hunting access—this is the most practical means of managing hunting access under this program. However, the Department's position is that farmer controlled hunting access makes sense from an efficiency standpoint, but the DNR apposes farmers using this access control to discriminate, and farmers who do not have the presence of 2 hunters per 40 acres of land suitable for hunting must allow hunting access on a first come, first serve basis. If they don't, they are not complying with the hunting access requirement and, according to statute, their claim shall be denied by the county. If the County fails to deny, the DNR is obligated to implement the statute requirements.

Thank you for sharing you thoughts, concerns and suggestions. Again, I recommend that you share you ideas with the Regional Task Forces which will be formed later this year.
