Budget Recommendation

Paper Ballot

P. 195, Item 5

Governor: Transfer \$7,500,000 in GPR from DOC to DHFS to reflect the transfer of the community intervention program from DOC to DHFS. Under current law, funds are distributed by DOC to counties based on a formula that reflects juvenile arrests and correctional placements and must be used for early intervention services for first offenders and intensive community-based intervention services for serious chronic offenders. Eliminate the requirement that these funds be used for first offenders and for serious chronic offenders.

Senators Moen and Moore: The 1995-97 budget transferred juvenile corrections programs from DHFS to DOC. Therefore, it is unclear as to why the governor is moving this particular program back to DHFS. Despite what agency administers the program, the funding should be earmarked for first offenders and serious chronic offenders. Without this requirement, funding for many successful county intervention programs, including the First Time Offender Program in Milwaukee county, could be threatened.

Motion: Ask the Joint Committee on Finance to determine what state agency should administer this program. Maintain current law to require community intervention funding be used for first time offenders and serious chronic offenders.

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
