**Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate**

This bill creates several new crimes, all of which are linked to prostitution, and provides additional disposition alternatives. It is unlikely that additional cases will result from these changes, but rather that the specific charges against persons may be somewhat different than is currently the case.

For counties, there will be a new cost of providing the court ordered "program designed to educate [certain] offenders about the about the effects of prostitution on the community and its neighborhoods" [from the LRB analysis] whenever the person receiving such education is unable to pay. The amount of any additional county costs is unknown.


