Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

If enacted, the provisions of this bill would reduce the ease of a minor in obtaining an abortion. There is no way to estimate whether any abortion procedures that would now be legal, but would become illegal as a result of this bill, would occur and thus be the possible subject for prosecution. There is no reason to believe that the number would be a significant workload increase for district attorneys' offices.

County costs of the district attorneys' offices are directly related to the state costs. Thus any increase in county costs would be minimal.


