Eligible students would receive an annual grant in the amount of \$250 from HEAB and a matching grant from a participating University of Wisconsin System institution, a technical college or a private institution. Residents and non resident students would be eligible for grants regardless of financial need. Three high schools in Wisconsin have International Baccalaureate degree programs that are recognized by the International Baccalaureate Organization: the organization with diploma granting authority. Together, 32 International Baccalaureate diplomas were awarded in May 1999 to students from those high schools. Nationwide, 3,883 International Baccalaureate diplomas were granted in May 1999. UW System institutions received transcripts from 25 students who received the diploma in May 1999. The						
students were about evenly split between residents (13) and non residents (12). If all those individuals enrolled at those UW System institutions and those institutions chose to participate in the International Baccalaureate Diploma grant program, UW System institutions would have provided matching grants totaling \$6,250 in academic year 1999-00. Because students are eligible to receive grants for four years, annual grant totals of \$25,000 could be expected by the fourth year of the program, assuming constant new enrollments of 25 students and no attrition. Annual grant costs could increase if the grant program generates expanded interest in UW institutions from resident and non resident diploma recipients.

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This bill does not provide funding for the grants. Therefore, UW System would have to fund the matching grants from tuition remissions. This would be consistent with funding for the Academic Excellence Scholarship program. Either separate legislation or an amendment to AB0592 would be required to authorize the use of tuition remissions for this purpose.

In addition the UW System estimates annual staff and computer processing costs of \$2,000, and one-time design costs of \$10,000 for integrating HEAB, financial aid, and admissions processes, assuming that HEAB administers the program. UW System costs would increase greatly if UW System institutions rather than HEAB were required to perform administrative functions such as eligibility screening, and data collection and warehousing.
