November 18, 1999 – Introduced by Representatives Turner, Black, Boyle, J. Lehman, Williams, Colon, Pocan, Kreuser, Carpenter, Hasenohrl and Bock, cosponsored by Senators Robson, Moore and Plache. Referred to Committee on Labor and Employment.

AN ACT *to amend* 103.10 (1) (c) of the statutes; **relating to:** the number of employes that an employer must have to be subject to the family and medical leave law.

Analysis by the Legislative Reference Bureau

Under current law, an employer, including the state, that employs at least 50 individuals on a permanent basis must permit an employe to take six weeks of family leave in a 12-month period and two weeks of medical leave in a 12-month period. This bill requires an employer, including the state, that employs 40 employes on a permanent basis to permit its employes to take family and medical leave.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

- **SECTION 1.** 103.10 (1) (c) of the statutes is amended to read:
- 5 103.10 **(1)** (c) Except as provided in sub. (14) (b), "employer" means a person
- 6 engaging in any activity, enterprise or business in this state employing at least 50
- 7 <u>40</u> individuals on a permanent basis. "Employer" includes the state and any office,

department, independent agency, authority, institution, association, society or other
body in state government created or authorized to be created by the constitution or
any law, including the legislature and the courts.

SECTION 2. Initial applicability.

(1) This act first applies to an employe, as defined in section 103.10 (1) (b) of the statutes, who is affected by a collective bargaining agreement that contains provisions inconsistent with this act on the day on which the collective bargaining agreement expires or is extended, modified or renewed, whichever occurs first.
