Proposal for Grants to Schools for Latchkey Program (At Risk Youth)

Representative Luther Olson and I are interested in proposing a pilot grant program for schools to implement or build upon existing Latchkey programs, utilizing \$150,000 in TANF. We visualize 12 two year competitive grants targeting four rural, four suburban, and four urban schools. We would like to build in flexibility because the needs of each school are different. However, the target population must be students who would go home to an empty house because their parent(s) are working. Students would be selected based on financial need. With first consideration should go to those parents who are working double shifts or who are experiencing financial hardship from daycare.

#### Background

I came upon this idea after visiting Jefferson Elementary in Stevens Point. The principal, Pam Bork, instituted the program as a collaborative project between the UW-Stevens Point and the SWEA (Student Wisconsin Education Assoc.) Organization. Currently, the program operates with 78 student volunteers who provide after-school care to 25 students. Other students participate in after-school activities, but do not participate in the Latchkey program. The other after-school programs are sponsored and run by community volunteers, parents, school staff and outside organizations. The entire program operates on only \$3,000 some of which comes from a small SWEA grant consisting of \$1500. The program runs every day between 3:35 to 5:00 PM. Children are involved in after-school activities such as intra-murals, dance, computer club, afterschool academic tutoring, art, boy and girl scouts, book clubs, big/brother and big sister mentoring programs and adventure club. Adventure Club is an experience oriented learning program where children are exposed to rock climbing and daring and cooperative activities which help students learn the skills for successful communication and collaboration. The Adventure education instructors facilitate activities that allow students to challenge themselves both physically and mentally. This program generates between 50-70 parents and students. Students and parents can also use the school computers and get tutoring for their studies. Midstate Technical College teaches on site two nights a week to provide parent's adult educational offerings while their children are involved in the after-school choices. Parents are required to pick up the students at 5:00 p.m. There is no cost to the latchkey program provided that the parents are diligent about picking up their child on time. (It is important to know that Jefferson's students are all within walking distance of the school.)

Latchkey works well as a collaborative program. The university education students gain the experience working with young children and the school benefits from the volunteers who supervise the students. In addition, the students are provided with additional positive role models in their lives. The program fits well with the school clientele and neighborhood. Latchkey applicants are screened for eligibility and all after-school activities are open to all children. The school assumes the necessary responsibility and liability of the program. It is effective because there are many after-school offerings at the school for students to participate in including Big Brothers/Big Sisters mentoring program, after-school tutoring program supervised by an

AmeriCorps volunteer, and Venus Book Clubs, Jazz, Ballet, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Hmong Boy Scouts, Hmong Girl Scouts, KEYS Counselor (counsels at-risk minority boys and girls), Computer Club and Art Club. Students move freely within the building to enjoy all the offerings with little or no cost to parents. Parents like the program because children are able to get their homework done and participate in after-school activities that do not create a disruption of family time in the evening.

Principal Bork last year wrote an application for a federal 21st Century Learning grant for \$500,000 based on serving at-risk children. It was anticipated with the high ranking of the grant, Jefferson was in a good position for receiving the funding this year. Last month, Congressman Obey was able to bring a \$500,000 grant to Jefferson and Madison Elementary schools jointly for at-risk programs. The community collaborative projects for the grant are: United Way, Portage County Health and Human Services, CAP Services, KEYS Project, Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts of Portage County, UWSP, Midstate Technical College, Big Brothers/Big Sisters of Portage County. We are working under a tight time frame as Governor Thompson has expressed interest in visiting the school soon after his State of the State address. We need to have this bill drafted and in circulation before then. If you have any questions please feel free to call either one of us or Principal Bork at Jefferson Elementary at 715-345-5418.

#### Analysis by the Legislative Reference Bureau

This bill authorizes the state superintendent of public instructions to award grants to school districts in the 2000-01 school year for after-school care programs. To be eligible to receive a grant, a school district must enroll pupils who are eligible to receive money under the federal temporary assistance to needy families program and who would otherwise be unsupervised by an adult in the afternoon after school. The state superintendent must evenly distribute the grants among rural, suburban and urban school districts.
