2	Whereas, March 5 is St. Piran's Day, a day honoring the patron saint of time
3	miners; and
4	Whereas, many of the tin miners who came to the Wisconsin Territory, starting
5	in 1827, came from Cornwall, England; and
6	Whereas, the Cornish were the first major foreign immigrant group to come to
7	Wisconsin; and
8	Whereas, the Cornish settled largely in the southwestern part of the state, in
9	what is now Grant, Iowa and Lafayette counties, to mine lead, using generations of
10	experience in deep, hard-rock mining to bring prosperity to the new territory; and
11	Whereas, a sizeable number of Cornish also settled in and around Palmyra, in
12	southeastern Wisconsin, to farm; and
13	Whereas, the Cornish, who were strongly opposed to slavery, played an

important role in the Civil War by constituting a significant part of 2 companies that

were formed in Mineral Point, Co. I, known as the Miner's Guard, and Co. E, known as the Farmer's Guard; and

Whereas, the traditional Cornish miners' way of life can be experienced today at the Pendarvis historic site in Mineral Point; and

Whereas, the considerable skill of Cornish stone masons is still in abundant evidence to all who stroll through the lovely streets of Mineral Point, Linden, Shullsburg or Platteville to admire the many homes and buildings built by the Cornish; and

Whereas, a Midwest Cornish Festival is held in Mineral Point each year, during the last weekend in September, featuring Cornish food, music, dance and guests from Cornwall; and

Whereas, of approximately 14 American Bards of the Cornish Gordsedd, 3 live in Mineral Point, one in Milwaukee and one, now living in Massachusetts, is a native of Racine; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the assembly, the senate concurring, That the members of the Wisconsin legislature salute all of the persons of Cornish descent for their tremendous contributions to this state, express appreciation for those persons who have kept alive Cornish culture, tradition, history and food and join all Wisconsinites who cherish their Cornish heritage in celebrating St. Piran's Day on March 5, 1999.
