The Department is currently delineating and classifying all wetlands 2 acres or greater in size for the WWI update program. Those isolated wetlands that are smaller than 2 acres in size are mapped as point symbols. Because the definition of "contiguous wetland" in this bill is vague, for the purpose of this fiscal estimate the Department assumes the definition of "contiguous" to be those portions of wetlands (regardless of size) that fall outside of the shoreland zone that are connected to wetlands 2 acres or greater in size within the shoreland zone. The Department currently maps all wetlands in the state, regardless of where they are located. State government costs: 40 hrs./ordinance X \$17.431 (WRZ Spec., Senior) = $$697 + \text{fringe } (37.6\%) = $959 \times 583 \text{ communities} = $559,097/6 \text{ years} = $93,183/\text{year} (2.0 \text{ FTE/yr.})$. Publication of public notice for final wetland map decision: 583 communities X \$50/notice = \$29,150/6 \text{ years} = \$4,858/\text{ year.}

Administrative Rule Revision

State government costs: 450 hrs. X \$16.534 (PPA 5) = \$7,440 + fringe (37.6%) = \$10,237 (one-time cost).

Local and State government costs are averaged over 6 years, with the result shown as an annual cost because the initial shoreland/wetland mapping and ordinance adoption effort was specified to be completed over a 6 year period.
