Current law authorizes a school board to adopt rules pertaining to the dress of pupils. This bill requires a school board to adopt a policy that requires pupils enrolled in the school district (including pupils enrolled in charter schools located in the school district) to wear a uniform in school. The policy may allow a parent or guardian to exempt his or her child from the policy. The school board must give parents and guardians at least six months written notice before implementing the policy and must assist economically disadvantaged pupils to purchase the uniforms. Costs to local districts are related to the assistance that they must give to economically disadvantaged pupils to purchase uniforms. Costs for uniforms will vary depending what component-oxford shirts, blazers, dress pants, jumpers- school boards recommend as uniforms. A uniform package of three shirts, two pairs of shorts, a belt, and a pair of pants or skirt is available from Ibiley School Uniforms for approximately \$80. Lands End's director for children's uniforms reports that components may range from \$19 to \$75. In 1998, the Title 1 program identified 133,700 low-income pupils in Wisconsin. Depending on the level of financial assistance that school districts would offer economically disadvantaged pupils, costs could be as much as \$10,696,000 (133,700 pupils X\$80). However, it is unknown how many economically disadvantaged pupils may be exempted by their parents or guardians. Therefore, these costs are indeterminable.				
It is assumed that school districts would be able to absorb any costs related to adopting a school uniform policy and providing written notice to parents and guardians.				
There is no state fiscal effect as a result of this bill.
