Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate:  This bill directs each school board to adopt a written policy specifying the criteria for granting a pupil a high school diploma. The criteria must include the pupil's score on the high school graduation examination (unless the pupil is excused from taking the examination), and may include the pupil's academic performance, the recommendations of teachers and any other criteria specified by the school board. Beginning in the 2002-03 school year, the bill provides that a school board may not grant a high school diploma to a pupil unless the pupil satisfies the criteria specified in the school board's policy.  The bill will neither increase nor decrease the state's costs related to developing the high school graduation examination. The examination will still be one of the criteria used in the diploma award decision and therefore, the state must develop a rigorous and valid test that will withstand legal challenges based on claimed property rights.  The bill will likely increase some local costs to school districts. The costs will be in the form of staff time and materials used to develop and administer local criteria. The costs are indeterminable, because individual board actions cannot be predicted, and there are no limits on the types of criteria that a board may adopt that the district will then have to administer.  Local costs may also be incurred as a result of legal actions against school boards' graduation policies.
