extends that requirement to all handgun sales. Individuals may have the background checks conducted through a firearms dealer or meets the requirements of a firearms dealer. To meet the dealer's requirements, an individual must have their fingerprints on file with the FBI. This bill allows for local law enforcement to collect the fingerprints and remit them to the Department of Justice. The bill allows for local law enforcement and the state to charge a fee to recover its costs and charge a fee for this activity. Therefore, the bill should have no detrimental fiscal effect on either local or state government.
