This bill has several sections. The first section creates a right for Internet service providers to sue civilly, persons who, in violation of their private agreements, use the provider's service to solicit Internet users. The Department			
assumes no fiscal impact associated with this first section.			
The bill also prohibits misrepresentation of a person's identity in an electronic mail message and requires parental consent for minors to give personal information to a person operating an Internet Web site.			
The bill requires an e-mail solicitor to provide a cost free method for recipients of their solicitations to contact them			
to be removed from future e-mail solicitations and requires the solicitor to honor that request. It also requires a			
person who maintains a commercial Internet Web site to display a notice on their home page describing their policy			
about collection and use of visitor information and requires each site to provide a method for visitors to consent to			
the use of their information. This bill then prohibits disclosing information about Internet customers without the			
customer's consent.			
It is difficult to determine the fiscal impact of a bill that is this broad reaching. The Internet has well over 1 million			
sites and it is unknown how many collect or share information about their visitors. There is no known method for			
informing all affected parties of the affirmative obligations placed on them by this bill and the department assumes			
the authors do not anticipate Wisconsin attempting to do so.			
For purposes of this estimate, the department assumes that enforcement of the provisions of this bill will be as			
complaints are received. The department assumes that, given the number of potential violators, staffing this			
program will require the following personnel. Six FTE Consumer Specialists and one FTE Program Assistant will			
mediate consumer complaints and educate both consumers and business about the requirements of the law. Three FTE Investigators will be needed to prepare enforcement actions where needed. The department assumes that			
greater national and international cooperation than ever before will be necessary to regulate the electronic business

community. Given the complexity of the jurisdictional issues, one FTE Consumer Complaint Supervisor and one FTE Attorney will also be needed. Finally, one FTE Management Information Specialist, for technical support, will be necessary.

One time costs for computers, hardware, telephones, and office setup will be \$115,700.

Long - Range Fiscal Implications

The department estimates annual operating costs to be \$631,000.
