
**Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate:**

SB 388 makes several changes to the commitment proceedings relating to sexually violent persons. Because it may result in more cases being brought for commitment proceedings, the Department believes that SB 388 may increase the amount of appeals that it currently handles.

Local governmental costs may increase as well because more District Attorneys will bring forth these cases. However, it is difficult to determine how many district attorneys will actually bring these type of actions and the Department cannot quantify that activity since it will be a discretionary decision.
