I have several additional drafting requests for the 1999-01 biennial budget. They include:

Treatment of Child Support Payments under W-2 – Under proposed federal regulations, states can only count the state's share of any child support passed through to a recipient towards the Maintenance of Effort requirement, if it does not affect the person's eligibility for the TANF program. Given this, please modify s.49.145(3)(b) to exclude child support payments in the calculation of income for purposes of eligibility for the W-2 program.

- Social Security Numbers on the Lien Docket Attached is a new DWD request.
- 3) Credit Assistance Modify s.49.143 (2)(cr) to read "Provide or contract with another agency to provide budgeting and financial planning, including credit establishment, training to participants". Delete the rest of that paragraph and the related allocation under s.49.175.
 - Child Care Eligibility- Modify the initial eligibility standard in s.49.155(1m)(c)1 from 165% to 185% of the federal poverty line, s.49.155(1m)(b)3 to remove the asset test and s.49.155(1m)(a) to cover disabled children, as defined by the department, ages 13 to 18.
 - TANF allocations (49.175) I still don't have numbers on these (or child care) but I do know that we will be eliminating the following separate allocations - s.49.175(a), (cr), (e), (d), (j), (q), (s), and (v).

Modifications to drafts already submitted:

- 1) Insurance Company Disclosure Amend s.49.475 to require DHFS to share the information received from the insurance companies with DWD.
- Public Assistance Collections Allow DWD to use "UI"-type collection methods only for overpayments that did not result from an agency error.

The Family Literacy Program will reinforce for W-2 participants and agencies the importance of literacy. The Family Literacy Program would be staffed by one FTE who will coordinate these efforts with the Governor's Literacy Director and other partners such as the job centers, Private Industry Council, libraries and the Department of Public Instruction. The staff person would promote literacy efforts, consult with W-2 agencies regarding best practices, and produce a model programs publication by the end of the biennium.

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This initiative supports the DWD strategic goals in that it improves the quality of customer service, supports families served by the Department's program and helps to achieve efficient service delivery.

Fiscal Effect

Budget \$75,000 in SFY 00 and \$100,000 in SFY 01 for 1.0 FTE Program and Planning Analyst position and travel and printing costs associated with the Family Literacy Program.



\$20 million would be split among communities that develop best

Madison -- Gov. Tommy G. Thompson this week will ask legislators to use federal welfare-reform funds to create a \$20 million "community youth" fund to be shared by communities who develop the best plans to help at-risk children.

In his State of the State message scheduled for Wednesday night, Thompson also will ask that part of the \$20 million fund be reserved for grants for two Milwaukee non-profit programs, Safe & Sound and the Wisconsin Good Samaritan Project Inc., an aide said.

In addition to making Wisconsin children a theme of his annual speech, the Republican governor also will propose a one-time \$200,000 grant to help a private group develop a way for small, private businesses to go together to buy health insurance for employees. Thompson aide Kevin Keane said the governor will weave the need to help children through many subjects in his speech, including health care, education, welfare reform, communities and the environment.

As an example of that emphasis, Keane said, Thompson will ask the Legislature to create the new \$20 million fund, with communities competing for grants from the fund.

Only the best project applications would be funded, except that "several million" would be set aside for the two Milwaukee projects, Keane said. He said exactly how much would be set aside would not be announced until the governor's Feb. 16 budget message.

In Wednesday's speech, Thompson is scheduled to say the \$20 million grant fund would "forge a partnership between state and neighborhood groups to help at-risk children get off to a strong and healthy start (and) build stronger families and communities."

"Today's children are the first generation of a new millennium, and we must make sure they area ready to tackle the challenges ahead," says the preliminary draft of the speech.

To pay for the \$20 million in new grants, Keane said Thompson will ask the Legislature to use federal Temporary Assistance for Needy Families funds the state built up as a result of W-2, the work-based alternative to welfare.

Guaranteed part of the \$20 million would be:

Safe & Sound: In its materials, Safe & Sound leaders say it fights youth crime and violence by organizing neighborhoods against drug sales and gangs and by giving youth safe, constructive activity centers after school, on evenings and on weekends and in the summer.

Officials of the group say they would like to first target an area of Milwaukee bounded by the Menomonee River north to Mill Road, from N. Humboldt Blvd. on the east to N. Sherman Blvd., W. Fond du Lac Ave. and N. 76th St. on the west.

It would cost \$7 million a year to run Safe & Sound programs in about 20 Milwaukee neighborhoods, which would dramatically expand a pilot program, the group's leaders have estimated. In addition to the state, that money would come from other sources.

Safe & Sound now gets some tax funds, Keane said.

Good Samaritan: In materials given to state officials, leaders of the Wisconsin Good Samaritan project say it would work with individuals and families to fight drug and alcohol abuse, child abuse, homelessness and family violence.


Keane said the new fund would be administered by the state Department of Workforce Development and grants would be awarded based on which programs would best keep children in school and away from criminal activity.

"We want to encourage communities to find ways to help at-risk children," Keane said.

Thompson will also propose giving a private group or industry trade group, which will be picked by the state insurance commissioner, a one-time grant of \$200,000 to develop a way that small employers can go together to buy health insurance.

The experiment would try to help "small employers who just don't have the purchasing power to afford health insurance," Kcane added. "The state's role would be to just get it started."

State insurance officials estimate that, if the experiment works, it might help make health insurance available to 35,000 workers at small businesses, Keane added.

Issue: Community Youth Grants

Purpose

To provide eligible youth with specialized services aimed at preventing public assistance dependency as well as improving social, academic, and employment skills.

Eligible Population

Youth ages 5-18 whose family income is at, or below, of 200% of poverty.

Fund Source

TANF funds will support all components of this program.

Program Summary

The purpose of this program is to better prepare youth for life and to succeed in a post-secondary education or in the work place. Children of low-income households have more opportunities for failure in school/in life and are more likely to develop harmful behavior, than their higher income contemporaries. This program seeks to establish models of services that supports positive behavior in children and their families and creates positive linkages with schools. It seeks to use multiple strategies such as the use of after school care programs, and in school programs as methods to better teach children basic life skills and positive behavior.

Eligible Applicants

Local W-2 agencies will receive a block grant to perform these services. W-2 agencies will be required to contract with community agencies. Preference will be given to agencies that serve children in a neighborhood setting and can address the unique educational and cultural needs of children in a local community setting. All governmental, non-profit, CBO's, and for-profit agencies are eligible to apply. Existing programs such as Passports for Youth will be eligible to complete and receive funding under this option.

Program Design

This program seeks to provide local communities with funding to invest in program models that serve children, strengthen the connection between parents, children and their schools, and improve basic life skills. Successful applicants for these funds would create programs that target low-income children for services and structure programs and services for youth in a local community setting. Program models can be designed to include the following basic principles:

- children should feel a sense of safety and structure;
- children should experience active participation, group membership, and belonging;
- children should develop self-worth through meaningful contribution
- children should experiment to discover themselves, gain independence, and achieve control over their lives;

- children should develop significant relationships with peers and adults; and
- children should feel the pride and accountability that come with mastery of a task or

Examples of Allowable services include:

- 1. Linking parents with children including parenting skills
- 2. Case management services
- 3. Drug and pregnancy prevention
- 4. Assessing and identifying learning disabilities
- 5. Academic remediation and advancement
- 6. Activities geared towards gifted students
- 7. After school care programs
- 8. Cultural awareness9. Transitional skills
- 10. Career choices and counseling
- 11. Life management skills (time, making adult decisions, problem solving, making use of community resources etc.)

Fiscal Effect

Provide a "block grant" to local 24 agencies of \$5.0 million in the first year and \$15.0 million in the second year of the biennium. Funding would be distributed to the agencies based upon some measure of the number of low-income children in each county, such as the number of children that meet the criteria for free lunch school programs.

Issue: Workforce Attachment and Advancement Fund

To provide funding for projects and activities designed to improve the likelihood that persons who have moved to unsubsidized work from the W-2 process or are currently employed but still low-income to remain attached to and advance in the workplace or return quickly to the workforce in the event they become unemployed.

Eligible Population

Low-income families who are no longer provided W-2 services or never received these services but remain within the 200% of poverty eligibility level for TANF-funded services.

Fund Source

TANF funds will support all components of this program

Program Summary

Participating agencies should focus on programs/services that promote job retention, prevent recidivism, strengthen attachment to the workforce, increase participants basic skills and literacy levels or broaden availability of supportive services.

Post employment services will, where possible, encourage and support employer participation, particularly in the design and delivery of training programs that support existing employment and projected employment opportunities.

Services should focus on short-term training to provide basic skills development, employment-specific skills development, stabilization of the client's position in the workplace, development of an understanding on the part of the client how the workplace works and how to fit in and advance, or if the client is recently unemployed, getting him/her back to work as quickly as possible.

Workforce Attachment and Advancement Funds may be used for continuation of projects initiated with W-2 reinvestment Funds.

Eliqible Applicants

Grants will be provided to local agencies through two tracks:

Track 1 – Available to W-2 agencies.

Track 2 - Available to PICS or their successors

Program Design

<u>Track 1.</u> A block grant would be available to W-2 agencies to extend and expand their contact and services to former W-2 clients who have been employed for six months and have family income less than 200% of FPL.

W-2 agencies may subcontract with state agencies, PICS or their successors, technical colleges, community based organizations or local units of government to provide "workforce attachment and advancement" services to their clients.

<u>Track 2.</u> A block grant would be available to PICS or their successors, for distribution to job centers, local government agencies, technical colleges and community based organizations. These funds would be awarded to provide workforce attachment and advancement services to persons who are not clients of a W-2 agency, but whose family income level makes them eligible for TANF funded services other than W-2. Funds may also be set aside to award to entities to provide statewide or multi-regional workforce attachment and advancement services to specific populations such as refugees, migrants and persons with disabilities.

Fiscal Effect

Provide funding of \$10 million (\$5 million for each track) in SFY 00 and \$20 million (\$10 million for each track) in SFY 2001

Literacy Initiative

- Statewide program
- Coordinated by the Governor's Literacy Director
- Funded from appropriations at DWD
- W-2 agencies may request funding from DWD
- Proposals to be reviewed by Gov's Literacy Director and DWD staff
- W-2 agencies most likely to receive funding would contract with local literacy providers
- Those literacy providers would train FEPS and employers
- Clients (W-2, FSET or otherwise TANF-eliigible) could be referred by the W-2 agencies to the literacy providers to receive services.
- Gov's literacy director, DWD and W-2 agencies would develop a plan to document and evaluate goals, performance, etc.

Early Childhood Programs of Excellence

Recent research on children's early brain development confirms that the early childhood years are critical. Proper stimulation and nutrition in the earliest months and years of life has a decisive, long-lasting impact on educational, social, and emotional development. Conversely, the absence of proper stimulation or negative experiences can have sustained detrimental effects. Cost-benefit analyses of early childhood intervention programs also show the fiscal value of investing in young children. A recent meta-analysis by the Rand Corporation indicates that high-quality, targeted interventions, such as preschool and home visiting programs, save money by preventing future expenses for remedial education, incarceration and cash assistance. (from NGA Best Practices document)

Proposal:

Provide funding to a minimum of 5 centers that provide a rich, stimulating environment/programming aimed at ensuring that infant and toddlers ages 0-3 years old reach their full potential.

The centers would develop "Programs of Excellence" that include the use of appropriate environmental stimuli at the appropriate time in a child's physical, intellectual and emotional development. More simply put, a child must hear language to learn to speak, must be exposed to the different components of sight (color, form, motion) to see and must be held and touched in order to become an emotionally whole and productive member of a family and community.

The programs would emphasize vision, language and touch by incorporating music, reading, foreign languages and educational computer games. While the primary focus is on the children, an emphasis would also be placed on parental involvement and education. Parents would be required to participate in some of the programming either before or after work and would be given written material that describe the importance of the early years of their child's life and what specifically they can do at home to help the child reach his or her potential.

In order to be designated as an Early Childhood Program of Excellence, the program would meet the above criteria and would have to provide a 25% local or private funding match. These funds could be used to serve populations that do not meet the low-income eligibility threshold of 200% of the federal poverty level.

In addition, these centers would spearhead an information and training program for the parents and the child care community in a specified surrounding area, providing public education about the new knowledge about early brain development and training child care providers in how their programs can best stimulate optimum development of children 0-3 years old. Child care centers whose staff receive the training would receive stipends, as well as family child care providers who are trained. The centers would serve as a showcase for staff training to be child care providers.

The program would be administered and evaluated by the Office of Child Care in the Division of Economic Support in the Department of Workforce Development.

Dianne, Wisconsin statute 49.175(1)(fs) should be modified to read:

"...For food stamp benefits provided under s.49.124(8) to qualified aliens, as defined in 8.USC 1641(b) and (c), and Section 584 of the Foreign Operations, Export Financing, and Related Program Appropriations Act (as contained in section 101(e) of Public Law 100-202 as amended by the 9th proviso under migration and refugee assistance in title II of the Foreign Operations, Export Financing, and Related Programs Appropriations Act, 1989, PL 100-461 as amended), \$4,600,000 in fiscal year 1998-99"

That will cover all the groups included under 8 USC 1612 and 1613 which we reference in the SOFSP statute 49.124(8), as being included in the State Option FS Program. The reference 8 USC 1641(c) covers battered aliens, and the reference Section 584 of PL 100-202 covers Amerasians.

It appears that Amerasians have never made it into the Immigration and Naturalization Act - Section 584 is included as an annotation to 8 USC 1101(definitions), but it is not in the INA itself. That's which that long citation always gets used when they are referred to in FS stuff.

Wisconsin's Fatherhood Initiative Community-Based Fatherhood Programs Grant Administration Proposal Submitted by the Children's Trust Fund Nadine Schwab, Executive Director

The Governor's Fatherhood Initiative encourages the positive involvement of fathers in the lives of their children to strengthen Wisconsin's families. With the leadership of the Children's Trust Fund, this initiative will touch many Wisconsin communities. The following design for a community-based grant program describes the methods for reaching Wisconsin fathers with the Governor's message.

The Children's Trust Fund

The mission of the Children's Trust Fund, which was created in 1983 by the Wisconsin State Legislature, is to reduce the problem of child abuse and neglect in Wisconsin and protect our state's greatest resource - it's children. The sixteenmember Child Abuse and Neglect Prevention Board - eight governmental members and eight public members administer the Children's Trust Fund. The Children's Trust Fund reduces the incidence and cost of child abuse and neglect by supporting programs that work in partnership with families to build and emphasize individual, family and community strengths. In addition, the Children's Trust Fund develops public education and information materials to promote awareness and understanding of child abuse and neglect prevention, and advises national, state, and local policy makers on child abuse and neglect prevention statutes and policies.

The Role of the Children's Trust Fund

The Children's Trust Fund provides funding, training, technical assistance, and close monitoring of 17 Family Resource Centers throughout the state. In addition, the Children's Trust Fund provides similar services for 21 community based family resource and support programs. The Program's Director has nine years of experience administering grant programs. The Communication's Director has coordinated and facilitated education programs for fathers at a family resource center. The Children's Trust Fund enthusiastically supports the Governor's commitment to providing community-based funding for fatherhood programs and is prepared to take the lead in administering these grants.

The Children's Trust Fund and Fathering

Approximately five years ago, the Children's Trust Fund followed through on a stanutory mandate to begin its own "fatherhood initiative." The result of this initiative was a comprehensive curriculum designed to encourage a father's involvement in his child's life. The Children's Trust Fund "Positive Parenting: Tips for Fathering" curriculum and 25-minute video have been used by many parenting education programs around Wisconsin. A 31-page booklet with the same title briefly describes the messages in the curriculum and video is also

distributed on a statewide basis. The topics covered include: 1) the importance of being the best father possible; 2) anger management; 3) positive ways to play with a child and help them explore their world; 4) listening and building self-esteem; 5) child development and positive discipline techniques; and 6) celebrating being a family.

The Children's Trust Fund and Parenting Education and Support Best Practices

Throughout the history of the Children's Trust Fund the concept of strength-based family support has become one of the guiding principles defining quality programs. Strength-based programs ensure staff and families will be viewed as partners and work together. This philosophy will be carried through to the fathering programs funded by this project.

Community-Based Fatherhood Grants

The Children's Trust Fund proposes the establishment of a community-based father involvement grant-program. Through this program, 25 community-based grant programs where the goal is generating father involvement in parenting will receive a one-time grant in an amount not to exceed \$2,000. The Children's Trust Fund will design and administer a request for proposals. Priority will be given to those applicants who demonstrate a commitment to parenting education and support along with an understanding of the strength-based philosophy in their community. Any community-based organization that represents a public or private non-profit or governmental agency or an organization that is duly incorporated and registered under Wisconsin Statutes will be eligible to apply for these funds. It is anticipated that schools, churches, police departments, chambers of commerce, family resource centers and other community groups will submit workable applications for these funds.

Proposals that clearly describe the community's commitment to fathers will receive top priority for available funds. These proposals must describe the actions the applicant, in collaboration with other community groups, will take to encourage fathers to stay involved or become more involved in the lives of their children. Generally, these programs may involve: 1) the development of a local media campaign, 2) hosting a parenting course for fathers, 3) coordinating and hosting a celebration of fatherhood, 4) creating and presenting an award for local fathers. Applicants will be encouraged to creatively design a program that communicates the message that fathers are important in the lives of children. Grant recipients will be required to provide a local cash match in the amount of five percent of the grant award.

Stories of Success

At the end of the funding period, grantees will submit a report outlining the success of the programs funded through the Governor's initiative. These reports will be compiled and submitted to the Governor's for his reference.

Technical Assistance and Support

In addition to administering the requests for proposals and the funded grant programs, the Children's Trust Fund will make available parenting resources for fathers. These resources will be available to all communities interested in building support for fathers.

Proposed Budget

It is anticipated that the following biennial hudget allocation will be needed to successfully implement the Governor's Community-Based Fatherhood Grant Program. Funds will be made available to the successful applicants on a one-time basis for the period of one year.

Grant administration expenses (RFP printing/postage Review Meeting expenses)	\$ 5,000
Printing and distribution of parenting education Resources for fathers	\$20,000
TOTAL	\$75,000

Note: Funded programs will be required to provide a 5% cash match for their program.
