C.U.R.E. Fund
Cigarette Use Resistance Education Fund

Background

In February, 1997, the Wisconsin Department of Justice filed a lawsuit against the tobacco industry to recoup Medical Assistance costs, as well as damages for violations of consumer protection, anti-trust, nuisance and other laws. On November 23, 1998, Wisconsin signed a settlement agreement with the tobacco industry. Under the agreement, Governor Thompson estimated that Wisconsin would receive \$5.9 billion in tobacco settlement revenue through the year 2025. According to the Legislative Fiscal Bureau, Wisconsin will receive \$185 million in 1999-00 and \$149 million in 2000-01.

Although the Governor's budget did not specifically direct the use of the \$334 million in anticipated tobacco settlement revenues, it indicated that funds should be used for a variety of state health programs and to provide partial reimbursement to state taxpayers for past costs associated with tobacco-related illnesses. The Joint Committee on Finance acted upon a variety of motions relating to the use of future tobacco settlement revenues. The C.U.R.E. Fund proposal is based upon the Committee's recommendations.

Provision #1 – Tobacco Control Advisory Council

JFC Action:

Create a 20-member Tobacco Control Advisory Council. The Council would meet at least four times a year, 11 members would constitute a quorum and a majority vote of the Council would be required to conduct council business and exercise its power. The Council would be authorized to create subcommittees and if elects to do so, one subcommittee would address the issue of populations most adversely affected by tobacco.

The Governor would appoint 13 members of the Council to three-year terms and also have the authority to appoint a member of the Council to serve as the chairperson. Members of the council would include: a) the Attorney General or designee; b) the DHFS Secretary or designee; c) the Superintendent of Public Instruction or designee; d) one member from each of the majority and minority parties in both houses of the legislature; e) one physician specializing in oncology, smoking cessation or public health; f) one member of the Wisconsin Health and Hospital Association; g) one public health officer; h) five representatives of organizations whose primary mission is to reduce tobacco use and/or its health consequences; i) one UW System student; j) two high school students, including at least one minority student; k) one person who is a member of a minority group; and l) one member of the Wisconsin Grocers Association.

Motion:

Adopt the Joint Finance Committee's recommendation relating to the Tobacco Control Advisory Council.

Fiscal Effect:

None.

Provision #2 – Segregated Tobacco Control Fund

JFC Action:

The Joint Committee on Finance established a segregated, nonlapsible Tobacco Control Fund to support activities related to a statewide comprehensive tobacco control program. The Fund would be a segregated aids appropriation and a program operations appropriation in the DHFS Division of Public Health. The funds would support grants and administration of a statewide tobacco control program.

Motion:

Adopt the Joint Finance Committee's recommendation relating to the Tobacco Control Fund except that the fund will be entitled the "Cigarette Use Resistance Education Fund."

Fiscal Effect:

None

Provision #3 – Statewide Tobacco Control Program

JFC Action:

The Joint Finance Committee required the DHFS to develop a statewide tobacco control program in consultation with the Council. DHFS and the Council would be required to consider successful tobacco control programs in other states in developing their recommendations. The Council's recommendations for the tobacco control program would be submitted to the DHFS Secretary by February 1, annually, beginning on February 1, 2000. In turn, DHFS would review the Council's recommendations and prepare a detailed annual budget for submission by March 1, annually, beginning on March 1, 2000, and approval under a 14-day passive review process by the Joint Committee on Finance.

The Committee also specified the distribution of funding between the components of the statewide tobacco control program budget would be based on the U.S. Centers for Disease Control's funding allocation recommendations for comprehensive tobacco control programs. Furthermore, the Committee specified that money deposited in the fund could only be used to support: a) community programs to reduce tobacco use and the burden of tobacco-related diseases; b) school programs; c) enforcement of policies restricting access to tobacco products and reducing exposure to second-hand smoke; d) partnership grants with statewide organizations and businesses; e) counter-marketing; f) cessation programs; g) surveillance and evaluation; h) administration and management; and i) projects designed to reduce tobacco use among minorities and pregnant women. DHFS would be required to solicit input from the Council regarding the selection of specific program or activities to be funded under the tobacco control program.

The Committee indicated that notwithstanding these provisions, tobacco control funds could be used to support minority health programs and federally qualified health centers (FQHCs).

Motion:

Adopt the Joint Finance Committee's recommendation relating to the statewide tobacco control program with the exception that tobacco control funds could not be used to support minority health programs and federally qualified health centers.

Fiscal Effect:

None.

Provision #4 -- Reporting Requirements

JFC Action:

The Joint Finance Committee requires DHFS to submit to the Governor and Legislature no later than July 1, 2002, and annually, thereafter, a report that evaluates the success of the program. The report must include the number of grants awarded during the preceding fiscal year, the purpose for which each grant was made and the donations and grants accepted by the Board.

Motion:

Adopt the Joint Finance Committee's recommendations relating to the reporting requirements.

Fiscal Effect:

None.

Provision #5 -- Funding for the Tobacco Control Fund

JFC Action:

The Joint Committee on Finance specified that the first \$6,292,000 of tobacco settlement revenues received in 1999-00 would be deposited in the tobacco control fund. In 2000-01, \$30.9 million would be placed in the Joint Finance Committee's SEG appropriation for release once the Joint Finance Committee has reviewed and approved the annual budget for the program. In future years, deposit the first \$30.9 million of tobacco settlement revenues received in that fiscal year to the tobacco control fund.

In 1999-00, the Joint Finance Committee allocated; a) \$400,000 (SEG) to the Division of Public Health's (DPH) tobacco control program operations appropriation to support 2.0 positions and tobacco-related surveillance activities. The \$5,892,000 (SEG) would be provided in the DPH tobacco control aids appropriation to support: a) \$1 million for the UW Center for Tobacco Research and Intervention (CTRI); b) \$1 million for the Thomas T. Melvin program; c) \$92,000 for a smokeless tobacco campaign; d) \$300,000 for a minority health program; and e) \$3.5 million to support federally qualified health centers (FQHCs).

Beginning in 2000-01, the following activities would be supported with funds provided in the tobacco control aids appropriation: a) \$1 million for the CTRI; b) \$1 million for the Thomas T. Melvin program; c) \$500,000 for the Medical College of Wisconsin to support smoking prevention and cessation activities; and d) \$4 million to support FQHCs; and c) \$300,000 for a minority health program. The Committee specified that up to \$150,000 in 2000-01 would be allocated for grants to schools offering instruction in the smoking/tobacco component of the Body Awareness Resource Network (BARN) software.

Motion:

The first \$15 million of tobacco settlement revenues received would be deposited in the "CURE" Fund. In 2000-01 place \$13 million (SEG) in the Joint Finance Committee's SEG appropriation for release once the Joint Finance Committee has reviewed and approved the annual budget for the program. In future years, deposit the first \$13 million of tobacco settlement revenues received in that fiscal year to the "CURE" Fund.

Adopt the Joint Finance Committee's recommendations relating to allocation of \$400,000 (SEG) to the Division of Public Health's (DPH) tobacco control program operations appropriation to support 2.0 positions and tobacco-related surveillance activities.

Beginning in 2000-01, the following activities would be supported with funds provided in the tobacco control aids appropriation: a) \$500,000 for the CTRI; b) \$500,000 for the Thomas T. Melvin program; c) \$500,000 for the Medical College of Wisconsin (MCW) to support smoking prevention and cessation activities; and d) \$100,000 for the Agricultural Diversification Grant Program to provide assistance to tobacco farmers.

Adopt the Joint Finance Committee's recommendation directing the Legislative Audit Bureau to conduct audits of the MCW and the CTRI tobacco control programs twelve months after they have received funding from the state under the biennial budget.

Adopt the Joint Finance Committee's recommendation that for tobacco settlement revenues deposited in the CURE Fund, the state could not expend more than 5 percent of these amounts on state administration and management costs and could not award grants with administration costs that exceed 10 percent of the total grant.

Direct the Department of Administration to study the idea of selling and transferring the state's rights to the tobacco settlement fund in order to create a permanent endowment fund. Specify the study be submitted to the Legislature no later than January 1, 2000.

Fiscal Effect:

The motion would reduce funding to the CURE Fund by \$15.9 million (SEG) in 2000-01. The \$15.9 million (SEG) appropriated by the Joint Finance Committee would be placed in the general fund.

Provision #6 - Occupation Tax on Attorney Fees

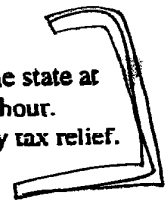

Background:

The law firms hired to represent the state in its case against the tobacco companies have requested a total of \$847 million in fees from the tobacco industry as their contingency fee. Open records requests to determine the total number of hours worked on the case have been denied. However, an attorney with one of the firms is reported to have stated that lawyers put in 50,000 hours on the case. Utilizing the \$847 million contingency fee, the firm's hourly fee would be around \$17,000 per hour.

* Motion:

Impose an 80 percent occupational tax on attorney fees for legal services provided to the state at the rate of 80 percent of the amount of attorney fees which exceed the rate of \$500 per hour. Specify that the revenue from the occupational tax on attorney fees be used for property tax relief.



Fiscal Effect:

According to the Legislative Fiscal Bureau, if the hourly fee for the law firms hired to represent the state in its case against the tobacco companies was \$17,000, the motion would increase general purpose revenues by \$613 million.

Tobacco Control Program

Motion:

Move to incorporate the following provisions into the bill:

Tobacco Control Program

Tobacco Control Advisory Council. Create a 20-member tobacco control advisory council (the "Council"), which would consist of: (a) the Attorney General or his or her designee; (b) one majority party senator, one minority party senator, one majority party representative to the Assembly and one minority party representative to the Assembly, appointed as are the members of standing committees in their respective houses; (c) the DHFS Secretary or his or her designee; (d) the Superintendent of Public Instruction or his or her designee; (e) one physician with expertise in oncology, smoking cessation or public health; (f) one student from the University of Wisconsin System; (g) two high school students, including at least one minority student; (h) five representatives of organizations that have as their primary organizational mission reducing the health or economic consequences of tobacco use or ameliorating the effects of tobacco use and reducing the incidence of particular diseases or health conditions associated with tobacco use; (i) one local health officer; (j) a member of the state's grocers association; (k) one person who is a minority group member; and (l) a member of the Wisconsin Health and Hospital Association.

Specify that the 13 nonpublic Council members would be appointed for three-year terms by the Governor, except that if a student member loses the status upon which the appointment was based, he or she would cease to be a Council member. Specify that the Governor would appoint one member of the Council to serve as the chairperson. Specify that the Council would meet at least four times per year, eleven members would constitute a quorum and that for the purpose of conducting business and exercising its power, a majority vote of the Council is required. Authorize the Council to create subcommittees to assist in its work, and if the Council creates subcommittees, specify that one subcommittee would address the issue of populations most adversely affected by tobacco.

Segregated Fund. Establish a segregated, nonlapsible fund called the "Tobacco Control Fund" to support activities related to a statewide comprehensive tobacco control program. Create a segregated aids appropriation and a program operations appropriation in the Department of Health and Family Services (DHFS), Division of Public of Public Health (DPH) to support grants under and the administration of a statewide tobacco control program.

Statewide Tobacco Control Program. Require DHFS to develop a statewide tobacco control program in consultation with the Council. Require the Council to develop program and budget recommendations for a statewide tobacco control program and submit these recommendations to the DHFS Secretary by February 1, annually, beginning on February 1, 2000. Require DHFS to review these recommendations and to prepare the detailed annual budget for a statewide tobacco control program. Require DHFS to submit a detailed budget to the Joint Committee on Finance by March 1, annually, beginning on March 1, 2000, under a 14-day passive review process. Specify that \$30.9 million SEG in 2000-01 would be placed in the Committee's SEG appropriation for release once the Joint Committee on Finance has reviewed and approved the annual budget for the program.

Specify that the distribution of funding between the various components of the statewide tobacco control program budget would be based on the U.S. Centers for Disease Control's funding allocation recommendations for comprehensive tobacco control programs. In addition, specify that monies deposited in the tobacco control fund could only be used to support the following activities: (a) community programs to reduce tobacco use; (b) community programs to reduce the burden of tobacco-related diseases; (c) school programs; (d) enforcement of policies restricting access to tobacco products and reducing exposure to second hand smoke; (e) partnership grants with statewide organizations and businesses; (f) counter-marketing; (g) cessation programs; (h) surveillance and evaluation; (i) administration and management; and (j) projects designed to reduce tobacco use among minorities and pregnant women.

Require DHFS and the Council to consider successful tobacco control programs in other states when developing their recommendations. In addition, require DHFS to solicit input from the Council regarding the selection of specific programs or activities to be funded under the statewide tobacco control program.

Specify that, notwithstanding these provisions, tobacco control funds could be used to support the minority health program and FQHC grants created under this motion.

Reporting Requirements. Require DHFS to submit to the Governor and Legislature, no later than July 1, 2002, and annually thereafter, a report that evaluates the success of the program. Require the report to include the number of grants awarded during the preceding fiscal year, the purpose for which each grant was made and the donations and grants accepted by the Board.

Funding Allocations. Specify that \$1.0 million annually of the amounts in the tobacco control aids appropriation would be provided to the UW Center for Tobacco Research and Intervention (CTRI) and that \$1.0 million in 1999-00 and no less than \$1.0 million thereafter would be provided to increase support for the Thomas T. Melvin program, notwithstanding the requirement to obtain approval from the Joint Finance Committee. Specify that \$92,000 of the amounts in the tobacco control aids appropriation would be provided to DPH to support a youth smokeless tobacco campaign in 1999-00, notwithstanding the requirement to obtain approval from the Committee. This funding allocation requirement would cease on June 30, 2000. Specify that \$500,000 annually of the amounts in the tobacco control aids appropriation, beginning in 2000-01,

would be provided to the Medical College of Wisconsin to support tobacco prevention and cessation activities, notwithstanding the requirement to obtain approval from the Committee. Specify that these funds could only be used for activities directly related to preventing individuals from smoking and assisting smokers to quit smoking.

Specify that in 2000-01 up to \$150,000 would be allocated for grants to schools offering instruction in grades six, seven or eight that purchase or have purchased in 1998-99 the smoking/tobacco component of the *Body Awareness Resource Network* (BARN) software. Require schools to submit a grant application to DHFS in order to be eligible for a grant in an amount not to exceed the costs of the smoking/tobacco component of the BARN software. Further, direct the Department of Public Instruction (DPI) to coordinate with the software manufacturer and CESA staff training sessions for the use of the software in the classroom at no additional cost. Provide that this funding allocation requirement would cease on June 30, 2001.

Funding. Deposit the first \$6,292,000 of tobacco settlement revenues received in 1999-00 to the newly created tobacco control fund and provide \$400,000 SEG in 1999-00 in the DPH segregated program operations appropriation and \$5,892,000 SEG in 1999-00 in the tobacco control fund aids appropriation and authorize 2.0 SEG positions, beginning in 1999-00, to support tobacco control and administrative activities. These positions would include an epidemiologist to coordinate surveillance activities and a program manager to coordinate program activities and staff the Council. Of the total \$5,892,000, \$1.0 million would be provided to CTRI, \$1.0 million would be provided to increase support for the Thomas T. Melvin program, \$300,000 would be provided to support a minority health program, \$92,000 would be provided to support a youth smokeless tobacco campaign and \$3.5 million to support federally qualified health centers (FQHCs) in 1999-00.

Annually, deposit the first \$30.9 million of tobacco settlement revenues received in that fiscal year to the tobacco control fund, beginning in 2000-01.

DHFS could include a request for additional position authority and administrative expenses as part of the annual tobacco control program budget submitted to the Joint Committee on Finance and the Committee could, if necessary, transfer funds to support these activities from the tobacco control fund to the new tobacco control program operations appropriation.

Tobacco-Related Provisions Contained in Budget Bill. Delete the following provisions from the bill: (a) \$500,000 GPR annually provided to the Medical College of Wisconsin; (b) \$500,000 GPR annually provided to the DPI for K-8 smoking prevention programs; (c) \$500,000 GPR annually provided to DHFS to establish a smoking prevention program for women and children; (d) \$1 million GPR annually provided to the UW Center for Tobacco Research and Intervention; and (e) \$200,000 GPR in 1999-00 provided to the Office of the Commissioner of Insurance to fund a one-time grant to an organization that would help establish health insurance purchasing pools for private small employees. In addition, provide \$166,700 GPR annually from general school aids to adjust two-thirds funding of partial school revenues to reflect the deletion of DPI funding under the motion.

Minority Health Program

Specify that \$300,000 annually of the amounts in the tobacco control aids appropriation would be provided to support a minority health program, notwithstanding the requirement to obtain approval from the Committee. Create a minority health program that would provide \$300,000 SEG annually to support the following activities: (a) a grant of up to \$100,000 annually for a private nonprofit corporation to conduct a public information campaign on minority health; and (b) \$200,000 annually for grants of amounts up to \$50,000 to conduct activities relating to the improvement of the health status of economically disadvantaged minority group members. Establish a 50% match requirement for the minority health status grants. Specify that the required contribution for the grant could be funding or in-kind contributions. Require DHFS to establish the application procedures for both the public information and health status grants.

In addition, require DHFS to do all of the following: (a) identify barriers to health care that prevent economically disadvantaged minority group members in this state from participating fully and equally in all aspects of life; (b) conduct statewide hearings on issues of concern to the health interests of economically disadvantaged minority group members; (c) review, monitor and advise all state agencies with respect to the impact on the health of economically disadvantaged minority group members of current and emerging state policies, procedures, practices, statutes and rules; (d) work closely with all state agencies, including the University of Wisconsin System and the technical college system, with the private sector and with groups concerned about the health of economically disadvantaged minority group members to develop long-term solutions to health problems of minority group members; (e) disseminate information on the status of the health of economically disadvantaged minority group members in the state; (f) encourage economically disadvantaged minority group members who are students to enter into career health professions, by developing materials that are culturally sensitive and appropriate and that promote health care professions as careers for the University of Wisconsin system, the technical college system and the Medical College of Wisconsin to use in recruiting the students; and (g) submit a biennial report that would include recommendations on program policies, procedures and practices and services affecting the health status of economically disadvantaged minority group members to the appropriate standing committees of the Legislature and the Governor.

Create the following definitions that relate to these provisions: (a) "African American" as a person whose ancestors originated in any of the black racial groups of Africa; (b) "American Indian" as a person who is enrolled as a member of a federally recognized American Indian tribe or band or who possesses documentation of at least one-fourth American Indian ancestry or documentation of tribal recognition as an American Indian; (c) "Asian" as a person whose ancestors originated in Asia south and southeast of the Himalayas and west of Wallace's Line in Malay Archipelago; (d) "economically disadvantaged" as having an income that is at or below 125% of the poverty line; (e) "Hispanic" as a person of any race whose ancestors originated in Mexico, Puerto Rico, Cuba, Central America or South America whose culture or origin is Spanish; (f) "minority group member" as an African American, American Indian, Hispanic or Asian; (g) "nonprofit corporation" as a non-stock corporation organized under Chapter 181 of the statutes; (h) "poverty line" as the non-farm federal poverty line for the United States as defined by the U.S. Department of

Labor; and (i) "state agency" as an association, authority, board, department, commission, independent agency, institution, office, society or other body in state government created or authorized to be created by the constitution or any law, including the legislature, the office of the governor and the courts, but excluding the University of Wisconsin Hospitals and Clinics Authority.

Community Health Centers

Specify that \$3,500,000 in 1999-00 and \$4,000,000 in 2000-01 and annually thereafter of the amounts in the tobacco control aids appropriation would be provided to support FQHCs.

Create an FQHC grant program and authorize DHFS to award grants to support community, migrant and homeless health centers. Specify that DHFS would award each of the following health centers the following percentages of the total available for these grants.

Note:

Under the motion, \$30.9 million SEG in 2000-01 would be provided in the Committee's supplemental appropriation. These funds would be available to DHFS to support specified tobacco control activities once DHFS has submitted to the Committee and the Committee has approved a detailed budget for the use of these funds.

In 1999-00, \$400,000 SEG would be provided in the DPH tobacco control program operations appropriation to support 2.0 positions and tobacco-related surveillance activities and \$5,892,000 SEG would be provided in the DPH tobacco control aids appropriation to support the following: (a) \$1 million for the CTRI; (b) \$1 million for the Thomas T. Melvin program; (c) \$92,000 for a smokeless tobacco campaign; (d) \$300,000 for a minority health program; and (e)

\$3.5 million to support FQHCs.

Beginning in 2000-01, the following activities would be supported with funds provided in the tobacco control aids appropriation: (a) \$500,000 for the Medical College of Wisconsin to support smoking prevention and cessation activities; (b) \$4.0 million to support FQHCs; (c) \$1.0 million for the CTRI; (d) \$1.0 million for the Thomas T. Melvin program; and (e) \$300,000 for a minority health program. Finally, the motion would require that the first \$6,292,000 in 1999-00 and \$30.9 million in 2000-01 of tobacco settlement revenues received by the state would be deposited to a new tobacco control fund.
