**Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate:**

This bill requires certain entities to release specified information to parents upon request. Among those entities are school district personnel designated by the school board who engage in alcohol or drug abuse program activities. The bill provides that any information received from a pupil that the pupil or another pupil is using or experiencing problems resulting from the use of alcohol or other drugs must be disclosed to the parent or legal guardian of that pupil upon request of the parent or legal guardian, unless the school board petitions the juvenile court for an order prohibiting disclosure of the information and the juvenile court, after a hearing and an inspection of the information, determines that the disclosure of the information to the parent or guardian would result in imminent danger to anyone.

Because it is unknown how many parents or guardians will request the above information, any costs related to this provision in the bill to local school districts are indeterminable. It is also unknown how many, if any, school boards will petition the juvenile court to prohibit the disclosure of information. Therefore, any costs associated with this provision in the bill are likewise indeterminable.

There is no state fiscal effect as a result of this bill.
