This bill requires DHFS to establish and implement policies relating to treatment for and conduct of persons detained or committed under ch. 980. The changes in the bill relate primarily to conditions of confinement issues. Because the								
State Public Defender's Office does not presently handle conditions of confinement matters, enactment of the								
provisions in the bill related to conditions of confinement would probably not have a fiscal effect on the SPD.								
The bill also specifies that if the facility in which a 980 patient is detained wishes to seek a court order determining the person to be not competent to refuse psychotropic medication, DHFS must file a motion with the court and the court must hold a hearing. It is unclear from the bill whether the SPD would represent in these matters. If so, then these would be new cases for the SPD. It should be noted, however, that such hearings may be infrequent because such medication orders would probably more likely be made at the final commitment hearing.
