Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate
Under current law, a person registering as a sex offender must provide specific information for the registry within 10 days of the time the person is released from prison.
Under this bill, a person required to register as a sex offender must do so before leaving the institution on parole. Persons from other states who are on probation or parole and are required to provide information for the sex offender registry must provide this information before entering the state.
In addition, parolees required to register as a sex offender must provide the Department of Corrections (DOC) with his or her new address ten days before the change in address occurs. Persons who violate this prohibition may be fined or imprisoned or both.
Obtaining information from parolees for the sex offender registry before their release from prison will have no direct fiscal impact on DOC. Obtaining information from a person required to provide information for the sex offender registry from a person from another state who is required to register will have no direct fiscal impact on DOC. Obtaining information from parolees 10 days before they change their address will have no direct fiscal impact on DOC.
This bill includes a penalty if a registrant establishes or changes a residence without following the registration requirements. It is difficult to estimate those costs at this time.



Testimony of State Rep. Steve Wieckert (R-Appleton)
Before the Committee on Corrections and the Courts
Date: 3/10/99
Re: AB99

Good Morning Chairman Walker and members of the Committee.

Today, I come before you to speak on behalf of my legislation Assembly 99.

Assembly Bill 99 is a bill that would require a sex offender to notify his parole officer prior to moving to another area. According to the current statute within our state, a sex offender would have up to ten days to notify his parole officer after moving to another area. As you can see, this is a loophole in the current statute that must be closed to ensure the safety to the residents of an area which a sex offender resides.

I put this legislation together after meeting with over 150 members of my community in September of 1997 at the Appleton Police Department. My constituents came out in support of this legislation after a similar situation arose within my district in which the legislation would have helped if it were place.

Through my two years of work on this legislation, the Wisconsin Department of Corrections has endorsed this bill as a way of more closely monitoring the sex offenders of our state.

Currently, no groups have come out in opposition to Assembly 99.

I ask the committee to vote in favor of this legislation to protect our citizens.
