We had tried many things to help our daughter become dry. None of them seemed to work. We tried things such as no drinks before bed and getting her up in the middle of the night. We took her to her doctor who could only offer medication on a temporary basis for those times that she spent the night else where. Nothing permanently helped. This had been going on for two years before we finally had one of your representatives come to our house.

Initially we were skeptical both because of the cost and about the possibility of success. We never make immediate decisions when someone comes and presents something to us. This was different. It was a long evening as we wrestled with the decision to use your service. The presentation convinced us that we were dealing with a problem that was different than the one we had been treating. Late that night we decided to go ahead.

Although it was not easy, the relief at putting this problem into someone's hands who knew what they were doing was great. Almost immediately, our daughters problem was improved. The Boys & Girls Clubs of Wisconsin (26 Clubs in 20 Wisconsin cities) promise to provide the following program and results to the State of Wisconsin:

THE PROGRAM

The 26 Boys & Girls Clubs will identify, with the help of law enforcement and public schools, 100 at-risk kids in each of their communities. The selection will be based upon students who are behind in two or more subjects in school, young people that have a record with law enforcement, who are from dysfunctional families, and who have a record of anti-social behavior.

The Boys & Girls Clubs will recruit these young people and mainstream them into regular Club program activities in a non-stigmatizing way while case management services and tracking are provided for the first year of participation. The goal of this program is to prevent 100 young people, between the ages of 6-18, from becoming involved in gangs, dropping out of school, or further trouble with the law and their families.


Specifically, here are the program objectives:

- Recruit 100 young people at-risk and provide them with constructive, positive alternatives to gang membership, anti-social behavior, and school failure.
- Maintain continued participation in the program by at least 80 of the recruited youth, two to three times a week, 52 weeks.
- Improve the school experience of 50% of the program participants.
- Have no juvenile justice system involvement by 75% of the youth.
- The cost of this program will be \$1,000 per youth for twelve months.

The Boys & Girls Clubs of Wisconsin will provide a complete detailed work plan, evaluation tool, budget, and methodology for this program that has been positively tested nationally.

Need for Services

Community needs assessment conducted by United Way and other community organizations have identified the following information:

- 23% of 7th graders use alcohol monthly
- 65% of high school seniors use alcohol monthly
- 55% of high school seniors are sexually active
- 40% of all middle and high school students (2,000+) do not participate in any after-school activities
- 63% of all middle and high school students have low self-esteem
- 70% of all middle and high school students indicate that they have no positive relationships with adults.





Message from the Board President

It has been a sincere pleasure to serve as Board President of the Wisconsin Rapids Area Boys and Girls Club these past two years. In this relatively short span of time,



the organization has changed significantly and continues to do so. Granted, there have been growing pains along the way; however, the positives have far outpaced the negatives. The end result is that the organization has reached a new and higher level of maturity. With such growth comes additional responsibilities and expectations from the club members and the community. Going forward, a detailed course of action has been set forth as outlined in our recently completed strategic plan.

Comments Regarding the Need for Additional GPR Funds to Prevent Childhood Lead Poisoning in the State of Wisconsin

Key reasons why the City of Racine Health Department supports increased state funding to prevent childhood lead poisoning.

Our situation is critical.

Too many children in the state of Wisconsin are lead poisoned or at risk of lead poisoning. Elevated blood lead levels are associated with harmful effects on our children's learning and behavior, and tragically may result in coma or death. Our state and local health departments have done an admirable job fighting the disease. In the City of Racine alone, the number of lead poisoned children has decreased from 601 to 413 since 1995. Unfortunately, future advances are in jeopardy. Ever decreasing resources are inadequate to address the task set before us. During the last few years in the City of Racine, a reduction of funding has resulted in the elimination of staff positions and supplies dedicated to the fight against lead poisoning. There simply is not enough money allocated to prevent the disease in the state of Wisconsin.

The City of Racine Health Department strongly urges Wisconsin to invest in our children's future. Lead poisoning is a preventable disease, but only if adequate funds are made available and directed to where they are needed most. Resources are needed for local public health departments where there is an identified lead problem. In 1998, \$879,100 in state GPR money was designated for childhood lead poisoning prevention programs. This works out to 17 cents per capita. Surely we can invest more to prevent the devastating health consequences of lead poisoning.

Resources are not only needed by local public health departments, but by property owners as well. In 1998, there were no state dollars available for property owners in the form of grants or loans to use for lead hazard reduction work. Identification of lead poisoned children and potential lead hazards is only part of the equation. Our fight against lead poisoning will truly never be won until resources are made available to abate lead hazards identified in our children's homes. In the City of Racine, lead poisoned children are often displaced because property owners cannot afford to conduct necessary lead hazard reduction work. This results in one lead poisoned child after the other moving from house to house and never being given the opportunity to heal in a lead safe environment.

We have fought the good fight against lead poisoning, but we need to redouble our efforts. Now is the time to invest in the future health of our children. The City of Racine Health Department implores the State Legislature to make available adequate funding for local health departments and property owners to prevent childhood lead poisoning. This burden does not necessarily have to fall entirely on the shoulders of our taxpayers; paint manufacturers could help the fight for as little as a dime surcharge on every gallon of paint sold in the state. Creative measures may need to be enacted.

We are at a turning point. We need to take action. History *should* remember us as the generation who took a stand and accepted the difficult responsibility of preventing lead poisoning. Anything less is failure – for our children and us all.
