

SUBJECT: Mail Ballot Addressing Gubernatorial Partial Veto of Certain Actions Taken at the

Committee's December 21, 1999, Meeting Under s. 13.10

DATE:

January 25, 2000

On December 21, 1999, the Joint Committee on Finance met under s. 13.10 to consider several state agency requests. Among the items approved by the Committee were the following:

- (1) Provide the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) one-time funding of \$34,000 SEG in 1999-00 and \$117,300 SEG in 2000-01 from the agrichemical management fund and authorize 1.0 integrated pest management (IPM) specialist project position through June 30, 2001. In addition, direct DATCP to promulgate administrative rules by January 1, 2001, that include, at a minimum, certification or training requirements of applicators and posting and prior notification requirements of pesticide applications, not to include sanitizers, disinfectants and germicides.
- (2) A transfer of \$9,700,000 FED in 1999-00 and \$10,000,000 FED in 2000-01 from the reserved portion of the Committee's appropriation under s. 20.865(4)(m) to the Department of Workforce Development's (DWD's) appropriation for the federal temporary assistance to needy families (TANF) block grant under s. 20.445(3)(md) for the workforce advancement and attachment program, with several modifications which included the following: (a) the specification that a noncustodial parent could be eligible for workforce advancement and

attachment services if both the noncustodial parent is determined needy and if the custodial parent and minor child are determined needy (needy means having an income under 200% of the federal poverty level); (b) a requirement that DWD count the income of the noncustodial parent's household when determining eligibility for the noncustodial parent; and (c) a requirement that each of the W-2 agencies in Milwaukee County subcontract with the Milwaukee Area Technical College District to provide all allowable services under the workforce advancement and attachment program, and that the amount of each subcontract equal one-third of the agency's funding allocation under the workforce advancement and attachment program.

On January 12, 2000, Governor Thompson signed the minutes, approving the Committee's actions, but in doing so, vetoed the following actions of the Committee:

- (1) DATCP-School IPM Regulations: The Governor's partial veto deleted the provision that would have directed that DATCP promulgate administrative rules by January 1, 2001, that include, at a minimum, certification or training requirements of school pesticide applicators and posting and prior notification requirements of school pesticide applications, not to include sanitizers, disinfectants and germicides. Under this veto, while one-time funding and project position authority are provided, DATCP would not be required to promulgate administrative rules regarding pesticide applications in schools.
- (2) DWD-Workforce Advancement and Attachment Program: The Governor's partial veto deleted the provision that would have required that both the noncustodial parent and the custodial parent be determined financially needy in order for the noncustodial parent to receive services under the workforce advancement and attachment program. Under this veto, only the income of the noncustodial parent would have to be considered.
- (3) DWD-Workforce Advancement and Attachment Program: The Governor's partial veto deleted the provision that would have required that the income of the noncustodial parent's household be considered when determining eligibility of the noncustodial parent for services under the workforce advancement and attachment program. Under this veto, only the income of the noncustodial parent would have to be considered.
- (4) DWD-Workforce Advancement and Attachment Program: The Governor's partial veto deleted the requirement that each of the W-2 agencies in Milwaukee County subcontract with the Milwaukee Area Technical College District to provide all allowable services under the workforce advancement and attachment program, and that the amount of each subcontract equal one-third of the agency's funding allocation under the workforce advancement and attachment program.

The Governor's objections were received by the Committee on January 13, 2000. Attached to this memorandum are copies of the Governor's veto message, those portions of the minutes which were vetoed, and the signature page of the minutes of the December 21, 1999, meeting.

Pursuant to s. 13.10(4) of the statutes, we are conducting a mail ballot to determine if the Committee's December 21, 1999, action on these matters should be upheld, regardless of the Governor's veto.

Dear Senator Burke, Representative Gard and Members:

Attached are the signed partial minutes of the December 21, 1999, s. 13.10, Wisconsin Statutes, meeting.

Pursuant to s. 13.10(4), Wisconsin Statutes, I am objecting to the Committee's action under several items of the minutes.

Regarding Item VIII, the Joint Committee on Finance provided one-time supplemental funding of \$34,000 SEG in fiscal year 1999-2000 and \$117,300 in fiscal year 2000-2001 from the agrichemical management fund and authorized 1.0 project position through June 30, 2001, for the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection's (DATCP) Integrated Pest Management (IPM) in Schools program. In addition, the Committee directed DATCP to promulgate administrative rules by January 1, 2001, that include at a minimum, certification and training requirements of applicators and posting and prior notification requirements of pesticide applications. Sanitizers, disinfectants, and germicides are exempted from this requirement.

I object to the directive to promulgate rules because ATCP 29 already includes certification and training requirements for certain pesticide applications. In addition, the IPM in Schools program provides training on pest management and pesticide use to school personnel and encourages the use of posting and notification in its PM manual. Currently, the IPM in Schools program is being implemented on a voluntary basis. Specific requirements for schools may limit the department's flexibility in implementing school pest management policy. Thus, I am partially vetoing this item to eliminate the directive for DATCP to promulgate rules. To address legislative concerns on the issue, DATCP will ask the IPM advisory group to review ATCP 29 and recommend any necessary changes to the Secretary of DATCP, the Governor and the Joint Committee on Finance.

Regarding Item XI, the Joint Committee on Finance (JCF) approved the Department of Workforce Development's (DWD) request to transfer \$9,700,000 FED in fiscal year 1999-2000 and \$10,000,000 FED in fiscal year 2000-2001 from the Committee's appropriation under s. 20.865 (4) (m) to DWD's

appropriation for the federal block grant under the TANF program under s. 20.445 (3) (md), for the Workforce Attachment and Advancement (WAA) program.

In addition, Committee action in Item XI specified that a noncustodial parent (NCP) could be eligible for WAA services if that parent is determined "needy" and if the custodial parent and minor child are determined needy. "Needy" is defined as having an income under 200% of the federal poverty level. The Committee also required DWD to count the income of the noncustodial parent's household when determining that parent's eligibility for WAA. That is, the department must count not only the income of a NCP but also the income of any other individuals residing in the noncustodial parent's household.

I object to both of these narrower eligibility standards because they will significantly limit the ability of agencies to serve NCPs. The department should verify only the needy status of the noncustodial parent and only count the income of that parent when determining eligibility for WAA services. With broader eligibility standards, the department would be able to serve a larger potential population of NCPs while maintaining the flexibility to give priority to serving families with needy children.

The Committee also required each Milwaukee County W-2 agency to subcontract with the Milwaukee Area Technical College District to provide all allowable services under the WAA program. Each subcontract must equal one-third of the W-2 agency funding allocation under WAA. Under the proposal submitted by DWD, any W-2 agency can choose to subcontract with the district if the agency determines that its WAA participants need technical college services. This new requirement, however, would provide funding directly to technical colleges regardless of whether W-2 agencies need technical college services for their WAA participants. I object to this requirement because it limits agencies in developing WAA programs that meet the specific needs of their respective communities.

Therefore, under Item XI I am partially vetoing paragraph a. so that the department must verify only the needy status of a noncustodial parent when determining eligibility for WAA services. Also, I am partially vetoing paragraph b. so that DWD must count only the income of the noncustodial parent, not the income of all household members, when determining the noncustodial parent's eligibility for WAA. Finally, I am vetoing paragraph g. in its entirety to eliminate the requirement that W-2 agencies subcontract with the Milwaukee Area Technical College.

- c. Direct DWD to provide workforce advancement and attachment funding to W-2 agencies through an addendum to the W-2 agency contract. Further require that WAA funding remain entirely separate from the W-2 agency base contract amounts, and require that the WAA funding not be added to the base contract amount for purposes of determining performance bonuses under the W-2 contract.
- d. Specify that DWD may not allow W-2 agencies or workforce development boards to offer wage subsidies under the workforce advancement and attachment program.
- e. Require DWD to develop a methodology for portraying the number of unemployed participants that obtain employment through the WAA program that accounts for an individual only once as a participant and only once as having obtained employment. Further, require DWD to track the number of participants who enter employment more than once during WAA participation.
- f. Require DWD to track WAA performance measures by category of services, where possible, and to develop additional measures of program effectiveness for the service categories where tracking these performance standards might be prohibitive. The services categories are the same as those specified under Act 9.

I. Department of Revenue

Moved by Representative Gard and seconded by Representative Kaufert to authorize 1.5 positions beginning in 2000-01 and supplemental funding of \$62,000 GPR in 2000-01 from the Joint Committee on Finance's supplemental appropriation under s. 20.865 (4) (a) to the Department of Revenue's general program operations appropriation under s. 20.566 (1) (a) for a cigarette tax processing and enforcement system and staff. Transfer funding from amounts reserved for the Department of Corrections for prison contract beds in 2000-01. In addition, provide funding of \$196,000 GPR in 2000-01 from the Joint Committee on Finance's supplemental appropriation under s. 20.865(4)(a) to the Department of Revenue's general program operations appropriation under s. 20.566(1)(a) for a cigarette tax processing and enforcement system if the Department of Revenue does not receive a grant from the State's Antitrust/Consumer Protection and Tobacco Enforcement Fund. Specify that this GPR funding would also be transferred from amounts reserved for the Department of Corrections for prison contract beds in 2000-01.

Moved by Representative Gard and seconded by Senator Burke to approve 139.03 GPR positions in 2000-01 to: (a) staff the expansion of the Milwaukee Secure Detention Facility (130.53 GPR positions); and (b) provide central office staff increases associated with human resources, training and procurement (8.5 GPR positions). In addition, transfer \$2,847,900 GPR in 2000-01 from the Department's appropriation under s. 20.410(1)(b) to the reserved portion of the Committee's appropriation under s. 20.865(4)(a) for future release for any salary shortfalls in the Department of Corrections.

Ellsworth Correctional Center.

Ellsworth Correctional Center; (b) 18.4 GPR positions to staff the operation of a minimum-security facility at the Fox Lake Correctional Institution; and (c) 17.69 GPR positions to staff the John C. Burke Correctional Center as a facility for female inmates. Specify that the authorized number of out-of-state prison beds is decreased from 5,514 to 5,157 to reflect the return of all female inmates to Wisconsin.

Require that the plan: (a) provide a time table for the return of inmates; and (b) be submitted to the Joint Committee on Finance and the Governor by January 5, 2001.

Moved by Representative Gard and seconded by Senator Burke to approve 3.0 GPR food production assistant positions and 1.0 storekeeper position for the production kitchen at the Redgranite Correctional Facility. Minutes of the Special Meeting to Approve the Report Relating to MPS

September 26, 2000

Co-chair Gard presided and called the meeting to order at 10:40 a.m.

Secretary's Note: Prior to Committee action on the motions, the Senate Majority Leader designated Senator Robson to take the place of Senator Jauch and the Speaker of the Assembly designated Representative Stone to take the place of Representative Albers.

1. Department of Public Instruction

Moved by Senator Moore and seconded by Representative Gard to modify the Milwaukee neighborhood schools initiative report to specify that no more than \$100 million of bonding, except bonds issued to make a deposit into a debt service reserve fund, or for a capitalized interest fund, an original issuance discount, the costs of credit assurance, or to pay issuance costs, may be issued without subsequent review and approval by the Committee at a meeting under s. 13.10. In addition, find that: (a) in considering the proposed Milwaukee Public Schools (MPS) change in K4 allocation policy from allocating a full per-pupil allotment to a full-time equivalent allotment to individual schools for each K4 student, the Committee recommends that MPS endeavor to ensure that the change will not affect the educational programming provided to K4 students; and (b) with regard to the impact of pupil mobility on educational achievement in MPS, the Committee recommends that MPS address the issue of pupil mobility and its effects on the education of pupils who move frequently. Require MPS to report on its actions with regard to K4 students and the issue of pupil mobility to the Committee by December, 2001.

Moved by Representative Riley and seconded by Representative Duff to direct MPS to provide written quarterly status reports to Joint Finance and to the Education standing committees of the Legislature on the facilities component of the plan being financing with bond proceeds or on a pay-as-you-go basis. Request the Joint Committee on Audit to direct the Legislative Audit Bureau to review the capital facilities expenditures and activity by MPS in the fall of 2002.

Moved by Senator Cowles and seconded by Representative Gard to require MPS to report annually to the Committee beginning in December, 2001, on the expenditure and revenue changes under the plan using similar categories and level of detail as shown in Appendix I in the companion document to the Neighborhood Schools Plan.

Ayes, 13; Noes, 3. [Duff, Riley, Burke]

Moved by Senator Decker and seconded by Senator Robson to specify that it is the Joint Finance Committee's intention that implementation of the Milwaukee neighborhood schools initiative will neither involve additional state funding nor involve any reduction in state aid received by other school districts in the state.

Ayes, 11; Noes, 5 [Stone, Riley, Burke, Moore, Darling]

Moved by Senator Burke and seconded by Representative Gard to approve the Milwaukee neighborhood schools initiative report, as amended, in accordance with Section 9158(7tw)(b) of 1999 Act 9. In approving the report, the Committee recognizes that those aspects of the plan that involve educational programming and the location of school buildings are decisions which, as in other school districts in the state, are the responsibility of the local school board.
