## ASSEMBLY JOINT RESOLUTION 15 TOBACCO SETTLEMENT RESOLUTION TESTIMONY BEFORE THE SENATE COMMITTEE ON ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT, HOUSING AND GOVERNMENT OPERATIONS STATE REPRESENTATIVE BONNIE LADWIG APRIL 14, 1999

Dear Chairman Wirch and Members of the Committee:

On February 5, 1997 Wisconsin was the 21<sup>st</sup> state to file a lawsuit against the tobacco industry. States had been pursuing settlements mainly to gain money lost to taxpayers for providing health care services to Medicaid recipients with tobacco-related illnesses. Wisconsin also pursued damages for violating the state's anti trust, consumer protection and public nuisance laws.

On December 4, 1998, Wisconsin along with 45 other states finalized a settlement with the tobacco industry. This settlement will bring Wisconsin approximately \$150,000,000 per year indefinitely unless certain reduction factors are triggered. Those factors include a reduction in the sale of tobacco products and Medicaid recovery claims by the federal government.

In order to eliminate the recovery of Medicaid dollars by the federal government, AJR 15 requests Congress to enact legislation that would specify that no portion of the money received by the states be withheld, offset or claimed by the federal government.

Because of the uncertainty of recoupment by the federal government, states which have received settlements must proceed cautiously with the distribution of their money. They may not be dealing with the actual settlement amount if the feds take a portion of it. It is important that we let our congressional delegation know that this money rightfully belongs to the citizens of Wisconsin. I would greatly urge your support of AJR 15.

AJR 15 has bi-partisan support and was adopted by the Assembly on January 28, 1999.
