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

Good morning Ladies & Gentlemen of the Committee;

My name is Mark Ladd. I am the Racine County Register of Deeds. I currently serve as the President of the Wisconsin Register of Deeds Association and the Secretary of the Wisconsin County Constitutional Officers Association.

Thank you for the opportunity to offer testimony regarding SJR-38, which provides fouryear terms for county constitutional officers.

The idea of four-year terms is nothing new, so I do not wish to unnecessarily belabor the concept. We have visited your offices, we have spoken with you at the WCCO Legislative Reception, and we have talked with you at local functions. By now, you can probably recite the rationale with us.

A four-year term is good public policy because it provides for better continuity in county elected offices, resulting in better service to the public. This is because the four-year term provides better opportunity for credible long-range planning and consistent policy development and implementation.

Perhaps I can break some new ground by publicly addressing another more practical concern. With all due respect to the members of the legislature, I must point out on behalf of county constitutional officers the fact that our offices are never "out of session". Quite frankly, campaigning frequently takes us away from the day-to-day duties the taxpayers pay us to perform. This is clearly not in the best interest of our customers. The less time we spend campaigning, the more time we spend doing the people's business.

The specific merits of SJR-38 are numerous. It reconciles itself to two other four-year term bills currently under consideration. It staggers the terms of the various offices so that half of the officers will be on the ballot every two years. In short, is has been well thought through and carefully drafted.

I have personally been in contact with the leadership of the Assembly and believe that they stand ready to act on this proposal as soon as it clears the Senate. Therefore, I ask that you not only support this bill here in committee but that you also do everything you can to expedite it's passage before the Senate so that it can be taken up by the Assembly in the waning hours of this legislative session.

RATIONALE OF 4 YEAR TERMS FOR COUNTY ELECTED OFFICIALS

- A four term will provide consistent policy development in public protection and improved 1. administration of justice.
- A four year term will provide better opportunity for long-range administrative planning and 2. good financial oversight in concert with county priorities.
- A four year term provides good public policy for continuity in County elected offices, 3. resulting in better service to the public.
- It takes three to four years before new officeholders reach their potential. For non-4. incumbents, the first year is a learning experience. They begin making changes in the second year and hopefully, will have all changes implemented by the third year.
- As County Courthouse Officials we are administrators. The State Legislature makes 5. policies affecting our offices and we ADMINISTER those policies.
- A four year term reflects the trend of public opinion. The response we receive from the 6. public, when campaigning indicates that many assume that our offices are for four years.
- 7. All States except for one or two have four year term of offices for these positions.
- Having four year terms could have the potential of decreasing the number of elections 8. election costs.
- The passage of a four year term bill by the Wisconsin Legislature would allow the voters the 9. privilege to voice their opinion on the issue through referendum.

This proposal is strongly supported by all the Courthouse Constitutional Officers.

Senate Joint Resolution 38

The Wisconsin Counties Association (WCA) supports Senate Joint Resolution 38, which proposes a constitutional amendment to, among other things, establish four-year terms of office for county clerks, treasurers, district attorneys, coroners, elected surveyors, register of deeds, and clerks of circuit court.

Over the last fifty years county government, not unlike all levels of government, has become increasingly technical and complicated. As the functions of county government have expanded, the role of county officers has evolved to meet these new demands. County elected officers have a number of specific responsibilities, however, with the exception of the county board and the county executive, policymaking is not among these responsibilities. SJR 38 seeks to lengthen the term of office for these non-policymaking, elected positions.

WCA believes that this constitutional amendment would be a positive public policy change for several reasons. Four-year terms for county officers would provide the stability needed to attract and keep highly qualified candidates. Four-year terms also allow county officers the time needed to implement effective programs without having to stop every two years to begin a time consuming and costly campaign for re-election. In addition, many of the programs that are administered at the county level now require a much higher level of technical knowledge than in the past. Four-year terms would allow these officers the time to gain the technical knowledge that is needed to effectively administer these complex elected offices.

We have many competent, experienced, skilled individuals serving in county government. However, current constitutional provisions place outdated limits on county government. We believe that SJR 38 is progressive legislation that will serve all of Wisconsin's citizens by meeting the organizational needs of county government in the 21st century.
