#### Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

Bill Summary: AB 456 proposes to reduce the fees charged for campsites in the state campgrounds by 50% for state residents who have attained the age of 65.

Fiscal Estimate: By reducing the campsite fees paid by state residents over the age of 65 by 50%, the Wisconsin State Parks and Forests would realize a net loss in revenue of approximately \$526,700 in the first full fiscal year after passage. This revenue estimate was calculated based on the assumption that 22.9% of all campsites are utilized by people 65 or older. This factor was obtained by using the age consumption data recently obtained from a Park Managers survey and supported by the Age of Household data supplied by the Applied Population Lab at the University of Wisconsin.

Additionally, the programs would incur higher operational costs associated with the proposal. These costs would be derived from the following sources: reservation system software design, publication and publishing costs, property computer upgrades, and additional labor costs. Additional unrealized costs will also be incurred as the law is being implemented. Measurable costs are estimated to be approximately \$84,000. Of this amount, \$64,000 would be one-time costs, and \$20,000 would be estimated on-going labor expenses. Additional workload would be incurred for age verification for reservations and check-in, and validation of eligible campers at campsites.
