Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

2001 Assembly Bill 463 relates to requiring headlamps and other required lamps to be lighted whenever the vehicle is being operated on a highway with a maximum speed limit of 55 miles per hour. Current law only requires these lamps to be lighted on highways during hours of darkness.

The enactment of AB 463 would likely create a large amount of publicity. Therefore, while some educating of the public on the new law would be necessary, there would not be a substantial increase in costs. These state and local costs would be absorbed in other advertising and education initiatives.

In addition, AB 463 would possibly generate an increase in revenue for counties and for the school fund from an increase in written citations. However, an increase in citing for this violation would have an inverse effect on citations for other violations. In other words, law enforcement officers would spend more time citing for violation of this new law proposed in AB 463 and would have less time to write citations for other violations. Therefore, AB 463 would not generate a substantial increase in state or local revenues.
