Intoxicated operation of sport recreational vehicles											

Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

This bill recodifies statutes on operating while intoxicated and safety laws pertaining to all-terrain vehicle, motorboat, or snowmobile operation. The bill applies a number of the policies in the motor vehicle code regarding operating while intoxicated to the operation of all-terrain vehicles, motorboats, and snowmobiles. The bill also applies policies from the motor vehicle code regarding penalties for refusing to comply with orders or instructions of a law enforcement officer, resisting a law enforcement officer by failing to stop or fleeing from a law enforcement officer while operating any of the vehicles listed above.

Some of the statutes created in this bill may result in imprisonment of the offender in a county jail or a state prison. The severity of the offense determines the length of time that the offender may be imprisoned. Since it is not possible to predict the number of offenders that will be sentenced to jails or prisons, or the length of time they would be spending in one of these facilities, the fiscal effect to the Department of Corrections and to local governments can not be determined.
