**Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate**

This bill would prohibit a person on probation, parole, or extended supervision from escaping from his or her probation, parole, or extended supervision officer if the person has been detained based on a probation, parole, or extended supervision violation. A person who violates this new prohibition may be fined not more than \$10,000 or imprisoned for not more than ten years or both. Provisions of this bill would apply to both adult and juvenile offenders.

DOC has no information on the number of escapes from agent custody and is therefore unable to determine the number of individuals that would be affected under the provisions of this bill. Therefore, a fiscal estimate is impossible for DOC to determine. It should be noted that to the extent this bill would increase probation, jail, or prison populations, additional resources would be required.
