JOINT LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL PREFATORY NOTE: This draft was prepared for the joint legislative council's special committee on state—tribal relations.

This draft encourages the governor to develop and implement a consultation policy under which state executive branch agencies: (1) ensure meaningful and timely input by tribal officials in developing state policies and programs that have a substantial and direct effect on: (a) one or more American Indian tribes or bands in the state; (b) American Indians in the state; or (c) the relationship between state government and the American Indian tribes and bands in the state; and (2) identify key personnel in the agency who are responsible for coordination with tribal governments and have them meet on a regular basis with tribal officials regarding issues of mutual interest.
